Number of Stories: Both the main block of the mill and the ell are three stories high. The wheel house consists of one story. The central cupola rises two additional stories above the main roof line.

Shape of Plan: The main block of the building, the ell and the wheel house, are all rectangular in plan.

Foundation: The structure rests on a foundation built primarily of stone. Sections of the foundation have been repaired or replaced with reinforced concrete.

Wall Construction: The walls of the first floor of the main section are constructed of stone. The upper floors are sheathed with diamond shaped stamped metal plating. is sheathed with boards and battens. The wheel house walls are built of stone.

Structural System: Slow-burning heavy timber frame construction.

The building has a gable roof sheathed with diamond shaped stamped metal plating. The roofs of the cupolas are also sheathed with metal plates. The wheel house has a shed roof sheathed with roofing paper.

Cupolas: The structure has a total of three cupolas.

Important Interior Features: Some remnants of the processing machinery including power line shafts and grain-scoop belts still survive.

Important Exterior Features: Of additional interest is the massive dry-laid stone retaining wall which runs along the west bank of the river south of the mill. The falls, remains of the dam, and the mill pond are also important elements in the historic environment of the mill.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

BRIEF HISTORY

The first mill on this site was built in 1856 by James H. Hutchinson. Hutchinson had previously accumulated a substantial fortune in the gold fields of California. In th mid 1860's L. B. Howe, a prosperous local businessman in partnership with F. Beach, purchased the mill from Hutchinson. In June of 1885 Howe enlarged and rebuilt the mill complex and the result is the mill structure which stands today. / Shortly after completion the building was described as "an ornament to the village and an honor to its builders."1 "Roller process" machinery, designed by the Case Manufacturing Company of Columbus, Ohio considered at the time to be the most advanced equipment in the country for grinding grain, was installed and the works became known as the "Chittenden Roller Mills". Grain was brought to the new mill via railroad and flour ground in Jericho was marketed all over New England. During the 20th century the mill changed ownership several times. Competition from the large western mills finally closed the water powered Old Red Mill in 1946. At present, the structure is partially occupied by a craft store. An automative garage is located in the rear portion of the building.

SIGNIFICANCE

The Old Red Mill is a major industrial landmark in Chittenden County and symbolizes the history of commercial prosperity of the town of Jericho.

It is one of the few surviving examples of a large late 19th century grist mill remaining in Vermont. The building displays many innovations including the extensive use of stamped metal sheathing.

The original interior organization and enough equipment survive to give the structure considerable interpretive potential as an industrial archeological site. The mill and its surrounding environment are also an important scenic resource. Photographs of the site have appeared in dozens of publications.
