DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

St. Thomas Episcopal Church is a small 1 1/2 story stone building. It is 30' x 40' with 16 walls. It is a simple rectangular building with a gable roof. There are two windows on each side with 6 over 6 panes in each. There is one window on both gable ends which are 8 over 8 on the west side. On the east side, the sanctuary area in the interior, the window is 21 over 21 surmounted by a lunette.

On the interior the floorboards are 4 to 6 inches in width. The interior is very plain except for the pews and the altar. While there is no gallery in the church at the present there are indications that there was one. On the west side there appears to be an openning which has been sealed up above the window that would have led to a gallery. There are 2 electric heaters on a large cross beam. The church has no basement but has a crawl space about 3 feet high.

The roof has been replaced with hand split shakes to use the same materials as the original. The shingles have a 5 inch exposure.

In 1839 a stone enclosure was put around the entire church property. The wall is still extant.

The church was built in C.1790 and was used by the inhabitants of the area. In 1822 the church was repaired by the people because it had fallen into disrepair. The church however was abandoned again in 1865 because it was felt it was unfit for use. It was repaired in 1875 and has been used ever since. There have been no major aterations to the building only ocassional normal repairs.

#### STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

C.1770

St. Thomas Episcopal Church is one of the oldest churches within Hunterdon County. As early as the 1720's the developing community saw the need for a church. The first church stood on the south side of the road, nearly opposite the present one. It was probably a frame building, for a girder and other timbers in the present church contain mortises and other evidences of having been previously used.

In May 1768 Reverend William Frazer reported that the old log church was so dilapidated that he had officiated in houses until spring. Reverend Frazer urged the congregation to subscribe for a handsome brick or stone church, to be started in the spring and completed in October 1769.

In May of 1769, the church was not even begun, because the people were still discussing the site. By September, however, the difference of opinion had been composed, and the stone walls were completed. Work on the church was slow and in July 1772 Reverend Frazer preached a special sermon to remind the people that the building was only fit for services scarcely five months of the year.


The coming of the revolution forced the church to It was reopened shortly after and continued to close. operate effectively until 1795 when Reverend Frazer passed For several years in the early 1800's the congregation away. was very small, there was probably no vestry, services were irregular, and the building and grounds were neglected. Dispite this the parish did not fold and in 1813-14 still contained about thirty families.

A revival of interest began about that time, after the appointment of the Reverend Daniel Higbee as missionary to vacant churches. He inspired the people to repair their "ruinous" church. In 1822 the church was thoroughly repaired and religious services were resumed under the ministry of Reverend Mc Douglas of New Brunswick, New Jersey.

#### SIGNIFICANCE

There was a suspension of services for about ten years, the church being considered unfit for use. In 1875-76, Frederick Potts of Pittstown financed and personally supervised a complete repair of the building.

St. Thomas' architectural significance rests on the fact that it is one of a few examples of 18th century architecture still extant in the county. It is a representative example of early churches in the area and the care which has been taken to preserve the building is important in its own right.

As one of the oldest churches in Hunterdon County, St. Thomas has a strong religious significance. The fact that the people felt a need for a church as early as 1723 and when it was no longer useful replaced it with the present building shows their feeling for religion. Several times the present church fell into disrepair and the congregation with the help of benefactors managed to restore it and continue to use it. Their feelings for church and this building throughout the past 175 years have contributed to preserving the building until today.
