

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**Description** The Confederate Soldiers Martyrs Monument in the Eminence Cemetery is a seven foot high white marble obelisk. It rests on a marble base that is approximately two feet wide. There are inscriptions on two faces of the monument. They read: "Three CSA Soldiers who were shot Nov. 3, 1864, at Pleasureville by order of Gen. Burbridge in pretense of retaliation of two Negras that were killed near Port Royal; Sleep on ye braves for you have got our sympathy to our latest breath. We would not have thee buried on a lot with him who has caused thy death;" William Tighe aged 30 years, R. W. Yates aged 30 years, William Datbor aged 20 years."

**Statement of Significance** The Confederate Soldiers Martyrs Monument in Eminence meets National Register criterion A and is significant within the context of "Civil war Monuments in Kentucky, 1861-1935." This monument isa good example of the property type obelisk. This is one of four monuments across the Commonwealth that was erected to men who were killed by Gen. Stephen Gano Burbridge in 1864 following a retaliation policy set forth in his Order No. 59. He ordered that four guerrilla prisoners be shot for every one Union man killed. More than 50 prisoners were killed as a result of this order. This monument was erected to three men killed in Henry County as a result of Order No. 59. It is significant because it is a Civil War monument in Kentucky that was built before 1935 has not been severely altered and has not been moved. Verbal Boundary Description - The Confederate Martyrs Monument whose boundaries form a circle with a radius of ten feet located in the Eminence Cemetery.

**Verbal Boundary Justification** - The area associated with the monument is restricted to the ground on which the monument sits and a small buffer around it. The setting outside such a restricted area is not seen as critically important to maintaining an integrity of association. Because the focus of the multiple property submissions is the significance of the monuments, their proposed area of listing will reflect that they have been considered by-and-large, in isolation from their surrounds.
