SOUTHERN HEIGHTS - BEECHMONT DISTRICT

The Southern Heights-Beechmont District is comprised of 38 residential structures and one non-contributing structure. The boundaries are roughly: Southern Heights Ave. on the north, Ashland Ave. on the south, the first alley east of 6th St. on the west, and Southern Parkway on the east.

The predominant style in the district is the Craftsman style. Hill Top Ct. and Maple Ct. are two small enclaves of exceptional examples of this style, 1910-1913, as interpreted by local builders. Although examples of the style can be found in various sections of the city, this is one of the most concentrated collections. Most are on a very small scale. There are larger examples of this style on Southern Parkway and 6th St. The typical elements found on both the large and small scale Craftsman style residences are shake shingles, multi-paned windows, crosshatch-paned windows, projecting purlins and knee braces under wide eaves. Other styles found in the district are Queen Anne, Colonial Revival, bungalow, and vernacular frame and brick cottages. Most of the construction in the district dates 1900-1910, with a few later examples, 1910-1920.

The Southern Heights-Beechmont district was developed under two separate corporations, but the combined architecture of the developments creates a cohesive residential district. The east side of Southern Parkway was the western boundary of the suburb of Beechmont and the west side of the Parkway was the eastern boundary of the suburb of Southern Heights. The two developments were first platted in the early 1890s, but construction did not begin until ca. 1900.

The 4500 block of Southern Parkway is the last block along "The Grand Blvd." , as it was originally called, which displays the grandeur of this prestigious suburb at the turn of the century. As the years have progressed, many of the stately homes on their large lawns have been divided into several units or demolished to make way for apartment complexes or commercial enterprises. This section of the Parkway also retains the heavily landscaped areas between houses which was once the hallmark of the entire parkway.

6th St., Maple Court and Hill Top Court are included in the district because they too have retained their sense of time and place and display architectural significance. Alterations and demolition have created a breakdown of this ambience to both the east and west of the Southern Heights-Beechmont District.

VERBAL BOUNDARY DESCRIPTION



Beginning at a point in the northwest corner of Southern Parkway and Southern Heights Ave., thence westwardly following the south right-of-way line of Southern Heights Ave to a point in the southeast corner of the first alley west of Southern Parkway and Southern Heights Avenue, thence south following the east right-of-way line of said alley 400'± to a point, thence west across said alley to a point in the southwest corner of said alley and the first alley north of Hilltop Ct., thence westwardly following the south right-of-way line of said alley to a point in the southeast corner of said alley and the first alley east of 6th St., thence southwardly following the east right-of-way line of said alley to a point 100' south of the southeast corner of said alley and Maple Ct., thence west 165' to a point in the east right-of-way line of 6th St., thence south following said right-of-way 190', thence eastwardly 400' to a point in the east right-of-way line of the first alley west of Southern Parkway, thence south following said right-of-way line to a point in the northeast corner of said alley and Ashland Ave. thence eastwardly following the north right-of-way line of Ashland Ave. and across Southern Parkway to a point in the east right-of-way line of Southern Parkway 400' north of Wellington Ave., thence east 200' to a point in the west right-of-way line of the first alley east of Southern Parkway, thence north 440'± to a point in said right-of-way, thence west 200'± to a point in the east right-of-way line of Southern Parkway 812'± north of Wellington Ave., thence westwardly across Southern Parkway to a point in the west right-of-way line of said parkway, thence north following said right-of-way to the point of beginning.

The boundaries have been thus drawn to include those structures on adjacent 6th St. and the east side of Southern Parkway which are consistent with the architectural character of the development. The surrounding buildings are of later vintage and detract from the otherwise cohesive character of the district, which represents a turn-of-the-century development. Although many of the adjacent 1920s and 1930s homes fit the age criteria for National Register listing, they do not contribute to this specific district.
