Narrative Description

Summary Paragraph

The District No. 10 School is located on a non-historic farmstead in the northeastern corner of Butler County, about 1 mile south of the Platte River and 3 miles west of Linwood, Nebraska (2000 pop. 118). Linwood is approximately 50 miles north of Lincoln, Nebraska's capital city, and about 15 miles northeast of David City, the seat of Butler County. The school and its associated outbuilding are clustered together in the southwest corner of the farmstead just north of Road 45½, which has historically bisected this section of Platte Township (Section 32, T17N-R4E). Mature trees separate the property from a farmstead to the east and provide a visual boundary to the north. The nominated property contains 2 contributing buildings: the gable-roofed, one-room frame schoolhouse and a small, shed-roofed wood /coal shed immediately to the east. There are no non-contributing resources.

Narrative Description

The District No. 10 School is a one-story, front-gabled frame building oriented with gables facing north and south. This frame school is constructed in a rectangular plan with a small historic front-gabled entry addition on the south and a small non-historic metal shed addition located against the rear (north) facade. The main rectangular mass of the building measures roughly 32 feet north-south by 16 feet east-west. A modern standing seam metal roof was recently installed to cover the still-extant historic wood shingles, which were in poor condition.

The foundation of the school is constructed of stone and mortar with a historic coating of cement stucco. The facades of the school are clad in horizontal wood clapboard siding. On the south (front) façade is a centrally located, smaller gable-fronted historic addition which serves as the entry. The front entry is accessed by a historic poured concrete stoop located in the southeast corner between the addition and the main mass of the school building. The front door is non-historic, constructed of metal and glass, and located on the entry's eastern facade. The entry and stoop are lighted by a historic exterior fixture located on the south façade of the main school building. One historic, 2-over-2, double-hung window is located on the south (front) façade of the entry addition. The outline of a now-enclosed entry is apparent on the western façade of the entry addition. Upon inspection the enclosed area appears to be a historic alteration approximately the size of a door and enclosed with matching clapboard siding. Two historic, 4-over-4, double-hung windows with wood sashes measuring approximately 24" wide by 75" tall, flank the addition on the southern façade.

The western façade consists of four regularly-spaced, historic, 4-over-4, double hung windows measuring approximately 24" wide by 75" tall. The north (rear) façade has a small non-historic metal shed addition which holds some of the mechanical systems. The only point of access is through a door on the eastern façade of the metal addition. A historic concrete block chimney projects up through the peak of the gable.

Attached on the eastern façade toward the northern corner is a small wooden deck in poor condition. The date of this deck is uncertain, but is believed to have been constructed sometime in the 1960s or 1970s. The openings on the eastern façade mimic the western façade; however, the most northerly opening was turned into a door at some point in the early-to mid-20th century. Above the door can be seen the enclosed portion of the former window. The historic wooden door, which has been modified to accept a panic bar on the inside, opens to the deck. A series of three historic, 4-over-4, double-hung windows measuring approximately 24" by 75" tall create the remaining openings on the eastern façade.

All corners on the original massing of the school retain their corner boards that terminate in simple capitals. The capital detail possesses the same profile as the historic wooden window hoods on the original main mass of the school. These details faintly echo the Greek Revival style.

Interior

The entry room consists of a historic horizontal bead board wall and an original floor. Separating the main original mass of the school from the entry is a historic wooden door. Through the door is a narrow foyer with two historic doors on the northern wall. This room, which would have historically been for coats, boots, and book storage, possesses the original

vertical bead board wainscoting on all walls. The plaster walls above the chair rail were covered with acoustic panels up to the ceiling at some point in the mid-20th century. Between the two doors, running from the ceiling to the floor is mid-20th century duct work. The original wood flooring extends from this foyer into the main classroom area through the two historic wooden doors. The original vertical bead board wainscotting and the mid-century acoustic panels are found throughout the classroom. On the south, east, and west classroom walls large chalkboards were removed by a previous owner and their indentations can still be seen. The primary chalkboard was located on the south wall, as evidenced by the extant original wooden chalk tray. On the northern wall is located a two tiered original wooden platform or stage. Higher up on the northern classroom wall and along the ceiling to the southern classroom wall extends-mid 20th century duct work. In the center of the northern classroom wall is located an opening for a stovepipe, presumably used when the building was heated by a coal / wood stove.

Wood / Coal Shed

To the east of the school is located a small wood / coal shed. This building is constructed of historic wooden drop lap siding on all facades, including the door on the south façade. Two small side-hinged door openings are located on the western façade, with only one of the doors still in place. A modern standing seam metal shed roof slopes down toward the east of this building. The interior consists of numerous historic studs and beams for the various divisions within the building, which sits atop a historic poured concrete foundation.

Integrity, Condition and Future Plans

Overall the Butler County District No. 10 School and its associated wood/coal shed retain excellent integrity. Most alterations and modifications reflect efforts to keep the school in service over its long period of significance. Only the small rear addition, the side deck, the removal of the chalkboards and the installation of a standing seam metal roof on both buildings post-date 1961. With the exception of the chalkboards, these alterations are additive and potentially reversible.

The property owner, Mary Sohl, intends to use tax incentives to rehabilitate the school into a country store and café where she will sell her own food products and other Nebraska-made goods.

The dwindling number of historic rural one-room schools is a common presrvation issue throughout Nebraska. The excellent integrity and condition of the District No. 10 School, combined with the overall significance of rural one-room schools, makes this property eligible under National Register Criteria A and C under the registration requirements established in the *Historic and Architectural School Buildings in Nebraska MPD*.

Developmental history/additional historic context information (if appropriate)

The date of construction for the District No. 10 School is uncertain. The property was donated for the purpose of a school or church in 1877 by Daniel and Elizabeth Powell. By 1881, Daniel Powell sold the surrounding parcel of land, stating that the conveyance included 80 acres excluding, "one acre on the South East corner reserved for School House."

The school continued in operation throughout the early 1900s with numerous small improvements made as they were needed. For instance in 1931, the school board approved the wallpapering of the classroom. The earliest known use of coal for heating the schoolhouse is found in 1931 when the school board approved payment for a regular coal supply. Many of the improvements to the school during the early- and mid-20th century consisted of wallpapering, painting, stove repair, lawn maintenance and cleaning.

By the 1973 – 1974 school year, District 10 had 16 students enrolled. At the end of the school year a petition by residents in the Linwood area requested dissolution and consolidation of District 10. In August of 1974 the County Superintendent authorized the dissolution of District 10, citing declining enrollment as the reason. Following consolidation the property was sold to Duane Svehla in 1974. In 2001, Robert and Carolyne Moenning purchased the property and in 2011, the building was acquired by Mary Sohl.

Statement of Significance Summary Paragraph (Provide a summary paragraph that includes level of significance and applicable criteria.)

The Butler County District No. 10 School is significant at the local level under Criterion A in the area of Education. As one of the few remaining one-room schoolhouses in Butler County, the No. 10 School is important to our understanding of rural education in this portion of Nebraska. From the earliest days of education in Nebraska up to the period of consolidation, the District 10 School represents the history of rural education and is eligible for listing under Criteria A for education. The school is also eligible under Criterion C as an excellent local example of a one-room school house.

Narrative Statement of Significance (Provide at least one paragraph for each area of significance.)

Butler County School District No. 10 and Early Rural Education

The Butler County District No. 10 School was established to provide education to the rural population of northeast Butler County in the late 1800s. For nearly a century the school performed this function with only a few alterations to the school building. Following trends identified in the *Historic and Architectural School Buildings in Nebraska MPD*, the District 10 School was constructed on a rectangular plan with a series of three or four windows on each side of the building, with the door facing south. Additionally, District 10 possesses entrances into the classroom; a vestigial design feature coming from the religious practice of having a door for each of the sexes, so that boys and girls maintained propriety.

During the 1800s school development was seen as an important aspect of a community. Supporting and funding the construction of a school demonstrated a community's prosperity, progressiveness and permanence. The Compulsory Education Law of 1887 signified the importance of education to Nebraska, requiring all children between the ages of 8 and 14 to attend school for at least 12 weeks a year. With this requirement came the construction and improvement of many district schools across Nebraska.

Butler County and its school system were both organized in 1869, the same year Union Pacific completed its transcontinental railroad. Early residents of the Platte River valley could see an influx of settlers on the horizon and worked actively to create political and social systems to meet anticipated demands. The nine school districts drawn up in 1869, however, would quickly prove insufficient as approximately 2,500 "persons pitched their tents," in Butler County between 1869 and 1872. At the close of the 1870s, the federal census enumerated some 7,310 people living in the county. School age children, who were entitled to a free education after the ratification of the Nebraska Constitution in 1875, made up almost 40% of this population.¹ Not surprisingly, the number of school districts grew exponentially during the 1870s. Considering its low number, School District No. 10 was likely the first created after 1869.

Building Improvements, School Consolidation and the One-Room School House Today

During the early 1900s Nebraska began a process of establishing standards for schools which resulted in alterations. According to the *Historic and Architectural School Buildings in Nebraska MPD*, one common improvement made to early schoolhouses was, "the addition of a porch and extra utility rooms." Based upon the design and materials of the front entry of the District No. 10 School, this early addition likely represents this aspect of rural schoolhouse development. Although several other alterations were made over the years, such as adding acoustic panels and modifying a window opening to accommodate an emergency panic door, all demonstrate a rural school's expansion and adaptation to modern standards. Most rural one-room schools would eventually succumb to the need for more modern amenities during the mid-20th century and, as the rural population simultaneously declined, were consolidated. This was the case for District 10, which closed in 1974 after nearly a century of service.

While many ceased to function in an educational status, several rural school buildings survived after consolidation. In 1906, there were 93 school districts in Butler County, Nebraska. A 1980 reconnaissance-level survey of Butler County identified 13 extant rural schools throughout the county. A 2011 resurvey of those 13 rural schools revealed that only 4 are still extant, with 1 being too obscured from view to determine its current state. The Butler County District No. 10 School possesses the best integrity and condition out the 4 extant, resurveyed schools.
