Describe the present and original (if known) physical appearance

The Chipley/Pine Mountain City Hall is an intact, one-story, brick, commercial-like structure built just after the turn of the century. Its front facade contains a double-doored entrance flanked by single-arched windows on each side. On the interior it consists of one large room (24' x 50') with a small hall and two jail cells 10' x 10' at the rear. There are two rear windows with iron bars and a side door. The front facade has a heavy, capped, dentated cornice. The doors and windows are arched and retain their original hardware. The ceiling is tongue and groove paneling, the walls are plastered, and the floor concrete. The structure completely fills its lot except for a small area in front. There are no outbuildings. The city hall sits in downtown Pine Mountain adjacent to a new commercial/government block and a vacant lot to the south. Changes include the addition of bathroom facilities in the 1930s, modern wiring ca. 1950, and other interior "upgrades" which were undone during the 1985 restoration. During this the ceiling was uncovered, plastering redone, wainscoting replaced, partitions removed, and doors and windows restored. This recent rehabilitation returned the building to near-original condition. It is now being used as a local history museum/archives.

Statement of Significance (in one paragraph)

The Chipley/Pine Mountain City Hall is significant in architecture as a good example of the type of utilitarian or functional structure built in a small Southern town at the beginning of the 20th century. Its resemblance to other downtown structures that were commercial in nature is in sharp contrast to more elaborate city halls in larger cities. It is this utilitarian, functional nature within the town's commercial area that emphasizes the small, but important, role that government played in the city's life at that time. The city hall doubled as a city jail. This building is significant in politics and government as the city hall and city jail where all local political and governmental activities would have focused: meetings of the city council, elections, etc. as well as the only penal institution in town, a temporary holding place for prisoners until transfer, if required, to the county jail. It served as the city hall/city jail until 1978. These areas of significance support property eligibility under National Register Criteria A and C.

Historical Narrative

The town of Chipley began in 1882 when a roundhouse was built there upon the completion of the Columbus and Rome Railroad from Columbus to that point. It was named for Col. William Dudley Chipley, a major stockholder in the railroad, who took a personal interest in developing the town which was to become a major maintenance center for the line. The town was incorporated by the State Legislature in November, 1882.

Chipley was laid out on land belonging to the L.L. Hardy Estate and W.H. Campbell. Several stores, two churches, and numerous residences were built during the 1880s east of the railroad. About 1890 a store was built on the west side of the railroad, as the town was beginning to expand on that side as well.

The town's greatest period of development was during its first thirty years. This was due to the railroad activity and its development as a trading center for a large farming area. By 1910, the population was 742, over 459 in 1900.

The population remained stabilized in 1920 with only 728, and declined by 1930 to 593. The decline was due to many of the same factors affecting similar small Georgia towns: movement to the cities following World War I; the agricultural depression of the 1920s; the increased use of the automobile for shopping in the nearby cities; and the continued outmigration of young people to find education and employment elsewhere.

After the Depression years of the 1930s, Chipley's population rose to 709 in 1940. Part of this was due to the development of nearby Franklin D. Roosevelt State Park and the Pine Mountain settlement project, both New Deal creations. After World War II, small industries began to locate in Chipley but had generally ceased by the 1960s due to consolidation and technological development.

The establishment of Callaway Gardens, two miles south of the town, in 1950 and the resulting tourist industry has provided the continuing economic support for the community and made up for the loss of these industries. By 1970 the population had risen to 862.

In 1905, W.H. Campbell, on whose land the town had been settled, was elected to the first of three terms as mayor. On March 3, 1906, he and his partner, R.A. Zachrey, sold the city a lot for \$225. It was upon this lot that the city hall was built. This was the first local government building. It eventually contained the city hall, city jail, police headquarters, and was used for public meetings and for military enlistments. It served as the city government facility until 1978 when a new city hall opened immediately next door.

The name of the town of "Chipley" was officially changed to "Pine Mountain" to be effective on January 1, 1958. It was heavily supported by Cason Callaway, Sr., founder of Callaway Gardens. He felt the new name would be more in keeping with the tourist industry since the area around the city and the gardens was already called "Pine Mountain."

In September, 1985, the former city hall, after restoration, was reopened as the "Chipley Historical Center of Pine Mountain," housing the city's archives and local history museum.

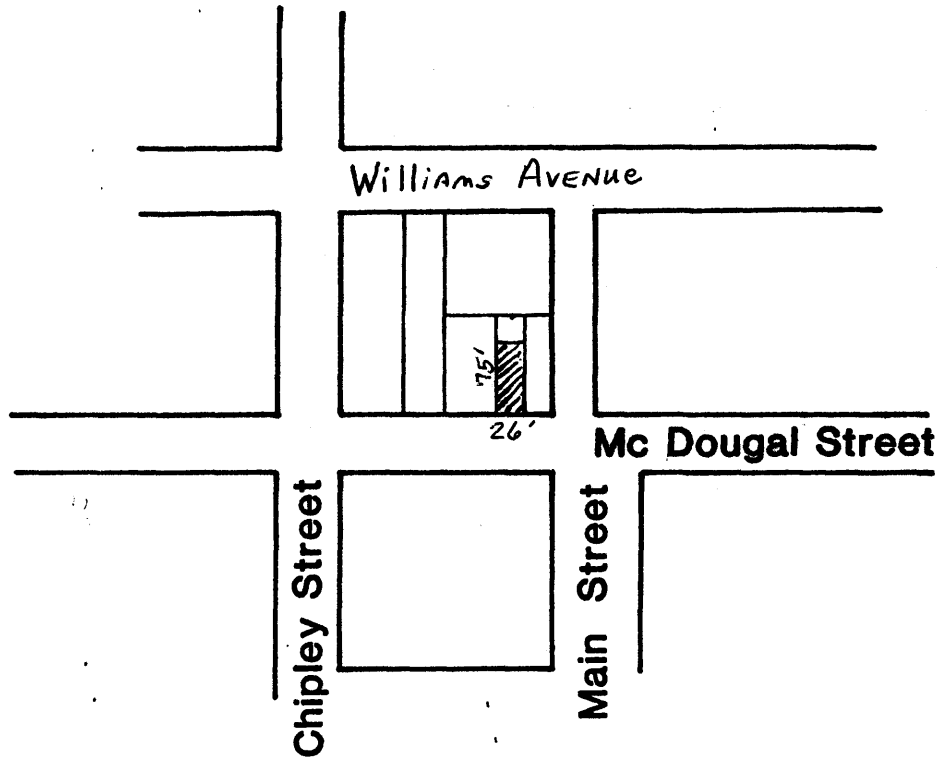
SITE PLAN

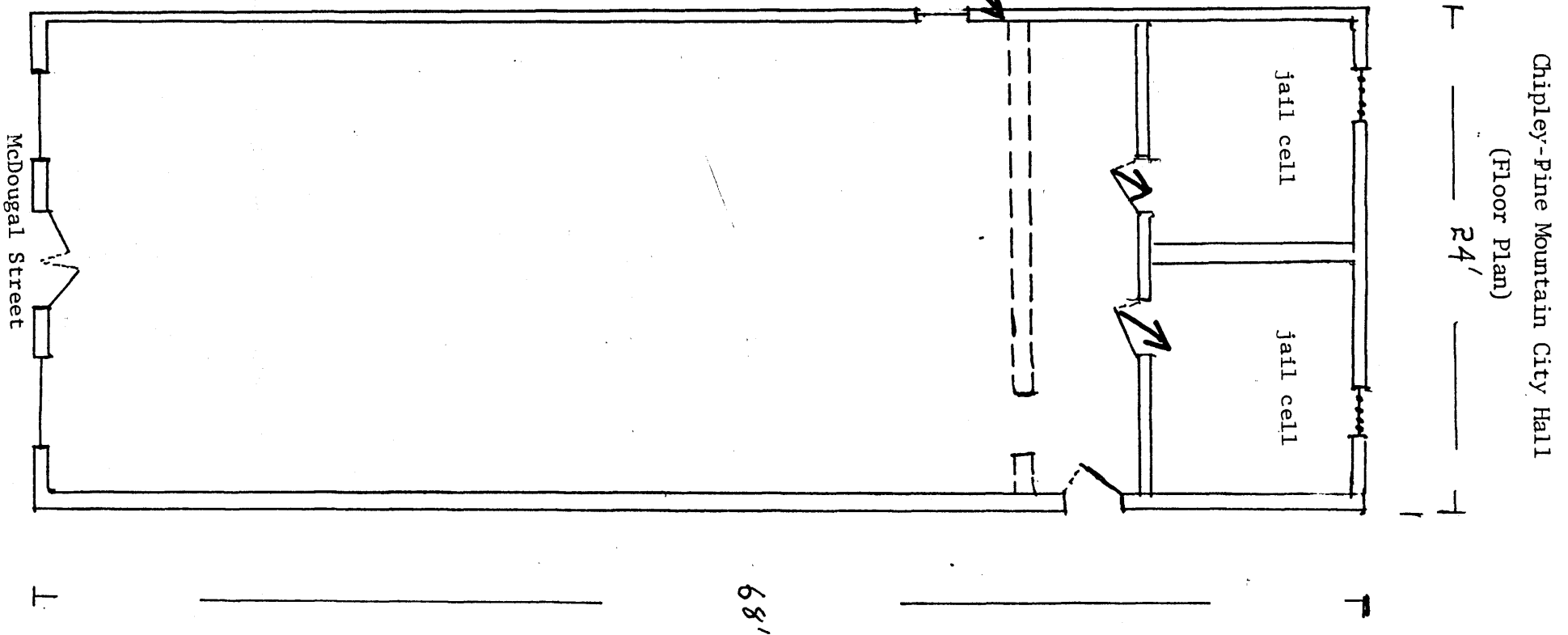
FLOOR PLAN
