Item No. 8A, cont. Architectural description:

The original exterior of the first story of the front (south) elevation has been covered by various wall treatments including vertical tongue in groove paneling, ceramic tile, and chrome and plate glass doors and windows. It is divided into three storefronts, each with a recessed bay entrance, and an apartment entrance. A metal awning of recent manufacture surmounts the whole.

The original exterior becomes visible at the second story. The building is faced with yellow Hebron brick laid in stretcher courses. The second story is divided into three bays by four pilaster strips. A base course of stone ties the pilaster strips together at their bases. Within each bay three double-hung, 1/1 wood sash windows (covered by aluminum storms and screens) are tied together by stone sill courses. The windows are unmolded with jack arches. Each bay is capped by a corbelling.

A metal frieze with recessed decorative panels surmounts the pilasters and bays and is in turn surmounted by a bracketed metal cornice and brick parapet capped by a stone course. The frieze brickwork, cornice, parapet and stone cap are carried around the corner and continue for a few feet on the west elevation.

The side (west) elevation is painted common brick. The windows terminate in segmented arches; the elevation is unornamented.
