Architectural Description and Significance: Exterior walls of this 1 1/2 story Flagg System house are Tennessee quartzite. The house is rectangular in shape and faces south. Window and door openings are asymmetrical. There are two pairs of ridge dormers, two chimneys with distinctive rounded openings, and eight shed dormers. The garage is attached. The dining room was extended one foot to the south, at some time, in an attempt to create a bay window. A bedroom was added on the second floor above the garage. and closing the fireplace on the west wall. There is an artificial fireplace on the north wall now. Casement windows now open outward, instead of inward. There is no basement and no attic. The laundry room is on the first floor. Upstairs, the bathroom floor is one step above the hallway. There is storage space provided under the roof.

This house is architecturally significant because it is one of a group of stone masonry houses built by Arnold F. Meyer according to Ernest Flagg's system of construction. It is also significant because it is one of four homes built by Meyer for members of his own family. This house was built for his brother-in-law Otto Fiebing.
