DESCRIPTION AND BACKGROUND HISTORY INCLUDING CONSTRUCTION DATE(S), PHYSICAL DIMENSIONS, MATERIALS, MAJOR ALTERATIONS, IMPORTANT BUILDERS, ARCHITECTS, ENGINEERS, ETC.

Log cabin. Log construction set on rock foundation; rectangle (17' x 22'); 2 bays wide; 1-story; round logs with saddle-notched corners; wood-shaked gable roof extended 5' on west to form porch supported by log posts; off-center vertical split wood entrance on west; metal stovepipe on north slope. Exterior features include 9-pane sliding and hinged sash with plain surrounds; exposed log purlins; vertical log posts in pediment on west; wooden deck with log railing.

This log cabin was a former border patrol cabin, built c. 1930s. The border patrol turned the cabin over to the USFS in the late 1940s. In the 1960s the State Fish and Game Department had an agreement to use the cabin as sleeping quarters for their personnel. Today it is used by both Fish and Game and NPS personnel. A new shake roof was installed c. 1979-80.

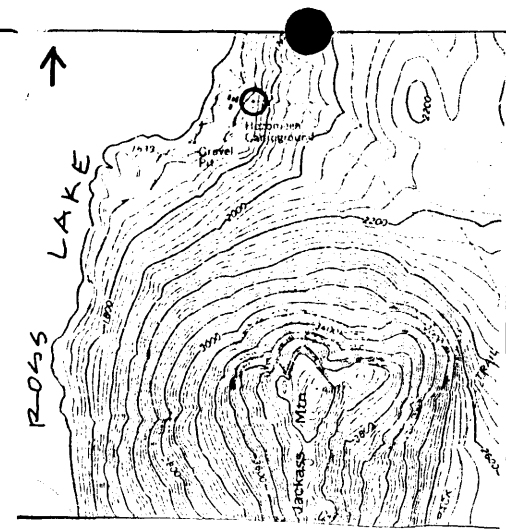
PHOTOGRAPHS AND SKETCH MAP OF LOCATION
