# Fort Caroline (20th century Replica) Structure #001

The exact site of the original is unknown. Historic research indicates that it was in this vicinity on similar ground. The existing fort is a scale replica (2/3 to 3/4 scale.) constructed in 1964. The construction of the replica was based on the drawings of Jacques LeMoyne, an artist with the colonists. Descriptions in the diaries of the colonists were also used. The structure is primarily earthwork, having one plank wall facing the river. It is roughly the shape of a triangle, 200' X 200' X 300', each point being modified to form a protective bastion for qun emplacements. There is a single entrance of heavy timbers and a moat: encompasses the Fort on two sides (the river is on the third side.) The base of the two earthwork walls measures 30' sloping upwards to 20' in width. They are topped by walls 4' high and 3' wide. The Fort is currently in good condition and requires only routine maintenance. 2nd Order of Significance. Location: UTM: 17/451905/3361550 RESIDENCE OF SCHOOL OF SCHOOL

### Ribault Column-Structure #003

This monument is the replica of the original as shown in the LeMoyne drawing of 1564. The original was placed at the mouth of the St. John's River by the French to claim this land in 1562. In 1924, this replica was placed at Mayport by the Daughters of the American Revolution. In 1957, the replica was moved to St. Johns Bluff, its present location. The Column and the bluff are currently in subb condition as to require only routine maintenance. 3rd Order of Significance. Location: UTM: 17/452920/3361670

#### Confederate Earthworks-Structure #004

The defensive earthwork battery, mounted several cannon and overlooked the St. Johns River. It is adjacent to the Ribault Column. It was constructed in September 1862, and abandoned by the Confederates to the Federals in October 1862. The earthworks exist today covered with trees and small shrubs. Clearing and restoration needed to bring it to the point requiring only routine maintenanceffor preservation would cost\$12,000. 2nd Order of Significance. Location: UTM: 17/452920/3361670

## Spanish Campsite Pond

This pond and the pine grove in the southwest side of it are believed to have been the site of the Spanish soldiers' camp the night before they attacked Fort Caroline. The marshy pond and pine grove, and adjacent ridge, match the description of the area written in 1564. The pond is approximately 10 acres. A reserch project is being conducted by the University of Florida under contract to National Park Service to determine the environmental factors affecting the pond. A computer model will be formulated which spells out alternative courses of action to take and their effects so that the manager may choose action to maintain the historical scene. continued maintenance costs will be determined by findings. #### STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

At Fort Caroline the struggle between France and Spain for supremacy in southeastern North America began and ended, virtually. When the Fort was founded in 1564 by French Hugenots (Calvinists), there was no other European colony on the North American continent this side of Mexico, and France hoped this colony would help establish her claim to the New World. The colony was a two-fold insult to Spain; first through the French King it challenged Spanish claims to this land, and secondly, it represented the presence of heretics which was intolerable to the Catholic Church in Spain. These factors served to trigger what was to be the first decisive conflict between European kingdoms for a region that later became part of the Continental United States. King Philip of Spain sent an armada to Florida in 1565. Spanish forces captured the fort, as its garrison had already been weakened by famine, internal dissension, and Indian attacks. Renamed San Mateo, the post was maintained by Spain through the colonial period. Recent reconstruction of Fort Caroline was based on a 16th century sketch.

In the 1800's the Fort site became significant again as a defense that was placed on the stratetic St. Johns Bluff overlooking the St. Johns River. The earthworks were placed there in an attempt to protect the city of Jacksonville, a favorite port for blockade runners. The battery was also to protect the entire St. Johns River "Valley." When the Union forces took the position, it gave them access to both, and cut off the North-South movement of Confederate troops in East Florida.
