

The William Chiles House (MM-MS-161) is a complex which includes the main dwelling and one historic outbuilding along with one early twentieth century building and a modern garage. The site consists of two contributing and two non-contributing buildings and is located on the west side of Richmond Avenue in Mt. Sterling, county seat of Montgomery County, Kentucky.

The William Chiles House enjoys a high degree of architectural integrity. The dwelling's setback from Richmond Avenue has been maintained as the approach along a narrow drive which ends in a tear-drop shape outside of the fenced domestic space. Mature pine trees frame the main dwelling. The major site intrusion is a modern (post-1940) garage built southeast of the dwelling.

MM-MS-161: Main Dwelling (contributing building)
The main dwelling built circa 1810 is a one and one-half
story, four bay (w,w,d,w) double pile, hall-parlor brick residence
on a stone foundation. Each side is flanked by a one-story, twobay, gable-roofed pavilion with interior gable end chimney. The
central entrance has a double-leaf door with a fan light. The
central entrance is covered with a flat-roofed porch supported by
pairs of fluted Ionic columns.

To the rear facade, several additions have been made which appear to be post-1940. A single, centrally-located, shed-roofed dormer has been added. A one-room, hip-roofed addition has been made to the pavilion on the north side and the gable roof extended on the rear facade of the south pavilion.

MM-MS-161A: Slave Quarters (contributing building)
The mid-nineteenth century slave quarters is located to the southwest of the main residence. It is a rectangular, one-story, two-bay (d,d) brick building with a gable roof. The gable roof has been extended on the north or main facade to form a porch pre1940.

MM-MS-161 B:Rectangular Outbuilding (non-contributing building)

The rectangular outbuilding dating from the early twentieth century is located south of the slave quarters (MM-MS-161A) and the main residence. It is a one-story, rectangular building with a gable roof. The exterior fabric is wide aluminum siding.

MM-MS-161 C: Modern Garage (non-contributing building)
South and east of the main residence is a one-story, gableroofed, post-1940, concrete block garage.

The William Chiles House in Mt. Sterling, Kentucky is significant under criterion C for its architectural design and group of domestic outbuildings that exemplify early nineteenth century for the domestic complexes. The dwelling was constructed circa 1810 with a hall-parlor plan and federal detailing. The building's original exterior design and detailing has undergone minimal alteration and retains its original architectural character. The building's exterior design is the most notable example of the federal style in Mt. Sterling. The site has the greatest number of intact mid-nineteenth century domestic outbuildings of any property in town.

There are very few extant early nineteenth century hall-parlor plan buildings in Mt. Sterling. Those that do remain are located on sites which have been reduced in size through subsequent subdivisions.

One example of the hall-parlor dwelling is the Jailer's House which is on the National Register as part of the Commercial District. It is a two-story, four-bay, single pile brick building which has been recently restored by the Montgomery Landmark Association. Its outbuildings, however, are no longer extant.

Another example is the Patten-Everett House (MM-MS-74), which is listed on the National Register as part of the Northwest District. The main block of the house dates from the early nineteenth century, but the dwelling underwent extensive remodeling in the late nineteenth century and has the exterior appearance of a late nineteenth century Italianate house. The acreage associated with Patten-Everett House was subdivided in 1906 to create Everett Court and its outbuildings are no longer extant.

The Chiles House and its historic outbuilding provide information about the use of slaves by the merchant class of Mt. Sterling in the early and mid-nineteenth century. The Slave Quarters is located within fifteen feet of the main dwelling and is made of brick suggesting the permanance of the institution, a degree of intimacy with the family in the main dwelling, and the financial investment in the slaves it housed. The living space for the servants at the W.T. Fitzpatrick House (MM-MS-142) built in the late nineteenth century is located in the second story of the buggy house which is a wood building located approxiamtely 50 feet from the main dwelling. The distance of the buggy house from the main dwelling and materials used in its construction suggest a more transient relationship between the family in the main house and the servants than is demonstrated at the William Chiles House.

William Chiles who determined the property's overall configuration after he bought the property in 1808 from McMillan. Chiles opened a general store in Mt. Sterling in 1805 and is noted as owning a number of slaves. Chiles sold the property to B.J. Peters in 1847. (DB 4/330 and DB 22/228).

Belvard January Peters who owned the property from 1847 until 1899 came to Mt. Sterling in 1834 after graduating from Transylvania University and reading law with Chief Justice John Boyle. Peters served as county attorney and then as state legislator. He was elected to the Court of Appeals where he sat from 1860 to 1878, serving as Chief Justice from 1876 to 1878. He returned to the practice of law in Mt. Sterling, dying in 1899.

The administrators of Peters' estate sold the property to Strother and Lula Mitchell in 1899 (DB 58/113).


Verbal Boundary Description

Starting at the point at which the centerline of the driveway intersects the west (on map) right of way of Richmond Avenue; then southwest 140 feet to point A; then west 630 feet to point B; then north 250 feet to point C; then east 670 feet to point D; then 140 feetwest south to the point of beginning. The boundary contains approximately 3.95 acres.

Boundary Justification

The boundary has been drawn to include all of the significant domestic architectural historic resources associated with the architecture of the era. The boundary excludes area which do not contribute to our understanding of the architecture during the period of significance.

The nominated area excludes modern residential development to the north and east, and farmland to west and south.
