Narrative Description

The Antigo Post Office was built in 1916 to the designs of the Supervising Architect's Office. The cornerstone of the building reads: "William G. McAdoo, Secretary of the Treasury, James A. Wetmore, Acting Supervising Architect, 1916." The Neo-Classical Revival style building is of tan brick with terra cotta and limestone detailing. The brick is laid in American bond with recessed mortar joints. It has a flat roof and sits on a raised, limestone foundation. The post office is located in the downtown business district of Antigo, Wisconsin.

The front elevation of the Antigo Post Office consists of a recessed, two-story central block with onestory side pavilions. Giant order brick pilasters with molded bases and acanthus leaf capitals define the central block. The pilasters support an elaborate terra cotta entablature with an architrave and frieze. The entablature is richly decorated with a variety of classical motifs. At the center of the frieze are raised metal letters stating "United States Post Office." Above the entablature is a projecting, denticulated cornice that wraps around the central block. Giving added height to this portion of the building is a tall, brick parapet with slight projections in line with the pilasters below. The building is capped by stone coping.

The two end pilasters on either side are set closer together. The others form frames for window and door openings. The ground floor openings have arched heads, the upper floor windows are rectangular. Above the first floor windows are keystones. These rise to the level of a decorative belt course that runs between the pilasters. The six-over-six upper windows rest on a continuous stone lintel, also running between the pilasters. The windows rise to the height of the entablature.

The side pavilions have an arched recess at their centers. Within the brick recess is a square-headed, sixover-six window. Above the arch is a keystone rising to the level of a slightly projecting cornice. This cornice corresponds in height to the stringcourse of the main block. The parapet above the cornice rises to the level of the continuous lintel of the main block. It is capped by stone coping. Suggestions of pilasters are found on either side of the arched opening. These are slight projections of the brickwork. The projection continues into the parapet. The slight stepping forward of the cornice, water table, and coping reinforces their image as pilasters.

The side elevations of the front block follow the pattern of the end pavilions. However, since there is a broader expanse of wall, these side elevations have two pilaster projections to add interest to the wall plane. The original back portion of the building has two arched window openings per side.

The interior lobby retains many of its original features. The space has a marble floor and marble wainscot. Pilasters with capitals support the vaulted plaster ceiling.

The Antigo Post Office has had exterior alterations. These include a new addition with a loading dock at the rear of the building. A handicap access ramp has been added at the front. These additions do not compromise the integrity of the original structure. The only change of note is the addition of aluminum storm windows over the original windows. The building is in good condition.

Narrative Statement of Significance

The Antigo Post Office is evaluated in the context of the multiple property nomination "United States Post Office Construction from 1913 to 1943, State Of Wisconsin – Milwaukee District." The building is nominated under Criterion C for Architecture, as an example of Neo-Classical Revival design for a small city's post office by the federal Supervising Architect's office.

Historic Context

The 1916 Antigo Post Office is the first federally owned post office building in Antigo and provided the first permanent home for postal services in the community. Prior to the construction of this building, the local post office was located in facilities selected by the postmaster. The first postmaster of Antigo was Nels Anderson. He ran the post office from his log store between the years 1879 and 1882. The site for the current post office was purchased from the Antigo Canning Company in 1911. The Antigo Post Office building dates from 1916 and was constructed at a cost of \$60,000.¹

As part of the larger group of federally owned post offices in Wisconsin, the Antigo Post Office represents a class of buildings constructed during the transition from individual designs to a set of standardized plans. The McAdoo classification system was adopted in 1915 and specified materials and the level of decoration based on postal receipts and the class of city. More information on the classification system is found in the multiple property nomination. Because the land for the new post office was purchased in 1911, plans for the building may have been prepared several years before the adoption of the McAdoo system.

Significance

The Antigo Post Office is significant under Criterion C for Architecture as an excellent local example of the Neo-Classical Revival style architecture, as used in the design of a public building. Elements of the style, as seen here, include the two-story pilasters and the large cornice with the parapet above. Other aspects of the design are more closely allied with the concurrent Beaux-Arts Classicism. These elements include the use of side pavilions, arched openings, and the rich embellishment of the frieze. These latter features and the use of brick as a building material give a somewhat lighter note to the design.

The building is also representative of the era of post office construction prior to the Depression when many post offices were built as public works projects. The majority of post offices included in this multiple property nomination date from the 1930s and are representative of this period. These post

offices tend to be smaller and highly standardized in their plans and materials. In contrast, the Antigo Post Office is representative of an earlier period of post office construction. Post offices of this earlier era are more individualized in their design, tend to be somewhat larger, and have a higher degree of ornamentation.

The post office presents an imposing image in Antigo's downtown. The building is taller than the commercial buildings adjacent to it and its architectural features, such as the tall pilasters and large entablature and projecting cornice, help portray an image of a solid federal presence. The building has remained largely intact and the noteworthy decorative features remain unaltered and without substantial deterioration. Also of note is the largely intact lobby with its valled ceiling. The Antigo Post Office remains a prominent building in Antigo's downtown. The sympathetic additions to the rear do not detract from the original composition and the overall integrity of the building is high.

In conclusion, the Antigo Post Office is eligible for listing under Criterion C for Architecture as a local example of the Neo-Classical Revival style and as an example of post office architecture prior to the widespread post office construction program undertaken by the federal government in the 1930s.
