DESCRIPTION

The Jay Cooke State Park CCC/WPA/Rustic Style Historic District is a 6.5 acre area which includes one building and one structure located just east of the town of Thompson. The park includes land on both sides of the St. Louis River which is a highly turbulent stream running through a very picturesque rock gorge. The gorge consists of basalt rock which is generally inclined 45 degrees from the horizontal and pitched toward the south. Additional rock formations are scattered throughout the park. Architects for the park buildings were from the National Park Service.

Department of Natural Resources building identification numbers are located after the name of each building.

The River Inn is one of the largest buildings constructed in the state park system with an overall length of 123' and a width of 48'6". The stone structure is considered a combination building and contained rest rooms, a shelter, a refectory, a dining room, and kitchen. It was one of the few park buildings which contained a full scale restaurant. The 32' x 50' shelter is located in the center of the building and features a massive stone fireplace and a heavy timber truss system. The shelter is flanked by rest rooms on the west and by the restaurant on the east.

The River Inn is basically rectilinear in form and is constructed entirely of dark, local gabbro with the exception of the gable ends which contain 1" x 10" rough horizontal boards. The building is covered by a cross-gable roof. An 11' x 32' entrance porch on the north facade is paved with slate flagging and is covered by a shed roof supported by three round, stone columns, each 3' in diameter. A 16'6" x 70' terrace flanks the south facade along the St. Louis River. The terrace is paved with stone and is defined by a low stone wall. Window openings are all casements, generally with six lights.

The refectory, or concession, was located in the restaurant wing of the building and featured a service window which opened into the shelter and there was also a counter which opened to the exterior on the south facade.

In 1945 a souvenir counter was installed in the dining room and in 1958 the kitchen was repositioned. Major alterations in 1983 removed the kitchen entirely and offices were installed. The dining room and refectory were converted into one large space to house interpretive exhibits. The canopy of the fireplace in the shelter was also completed with the installation of copper panels based on the original plans which have never been executed.

The Swinging Bridge is a suspension bridge with a 126' span over the St. Louis River. The bridge is supported by two massive pylons consisting of reinforced concrete piers faced with native stone laid in a rustic ashlar design. The suspension cables are anchored in a solid rock ledge on the south side and in concrete anchorage on the north. Stone piers on both sides of the bridge support walkways which lead to the suspended section. Originally, 8" or 10" peeled cedar logs were used as approach railings and the bridge deck was constructed with 2" white oak flooring laid 1/2" apart. The bridge is 200' long in its entirety.

The bridge was originally 18' above the St. Louis River. However, the bridge deck was raised in 1941 due to a problem with washouts. The bridge was again modified in 1953 by extending the existing concrete cores of the pylons. This further increased the distance from the bridge deck to the river in order to minimize the possibility of a washout. In 1977 the spalled concrete caps were repaired.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

The Jay Cooke State Park CCC/WPA/Rustic Style Historic District is historically significant for its association with the social, political, and economic impact of the Great Depression and the subsequent development of the various Federal Relief Programs which were responsible for its construction. The Jay Cooke State Park Historic District is also significant as a major recreational facility which received intensive use from residents of the surrounding communities and the City of Duluth.

The River Inn and the Swinging Bridge are architecturally significant as outstanding examples of Rustic Style construction featuring a dark native stone which blends with the rocky gorge of the adjacent St. Louis River. The River Inn is one of the largest and most fully developed buildings in the state park system, and specific features such as the rounded columns on the entrance porch and canopy above the shelter fireplace have no counterpart in any other state park buildings. The Swinging Bridge is also significant as the best example of a suspension bridge in the state park system, and one of only two examples. The landscape design for the district is architecturally significant for its ability to successfully concentrate the intensive use areas of the park which had been previously scattered along the entire 7 mile park drive. Surviving master plans for the park also document both the sophistication and precision of the design. A vicinity map was prepared as part of the development scheme and describes the surrounding area within a 50 mile radius. A remarkable amount of information is contained on the map including facts about the nearby population, mean temperature, average rainfall, as well as the location of roads, trails, power lines, historical sites, etc. detailed site plan was prepared for the area containing the River Inn and the Swinging Bridge which also included a "tree key" that located the position of every white pine, white spruce, white birch, and maple tree in the area. Instructions on the plan stated that, "All trees planted to be native to the area and in same proportion as surrounding woods so as to blend with existing plant growth." Specific plants and shrubs were also suggested for plantings in shady areas and along man-made rock outcroppings.

Jay Cooke State Park was established in 1915 when the St. Louis Power Company donated 2,350 acres of land for that purpose. Large scale development began in 1933 when C.C.C. Camp SP-2 occupied the park on June 22, 1933. This camp constructed the Swinging Bridge, the Service

Yard, and began development of the Oldenburg Point Picnic Grounds. They were also involved in eliminating soil erosion and in landscaping the Skyline Parkway so that the road would blend with the natural setting. However, due to declining C.C.C. enrollment on a nationwide basis, this camp was one of three in Minnesota which were terminated unexpectedly in October 1935. At that point, the picnic shelter at Oldenburg Point was only about half finished. However, the Lake Shore C.C.C. Camp SP-18 located north of Duluth provided the manpower to finish a number of incomplete projects.

A second C.C.C. Camp SP-21 Company 1171 was established in the park in May 1939. This camp continued development at the park and rebuilt the Swinging Bridge and constructed the River Inn. This camp was terminated on March 25, 1942 just before the C.C.C. came to an end. The WPA was also active in the park on a limited basis and was mainly involved with road work.
