Describe present and historic physical appearance.

"The Hill" (1884) is a large frame galleried cottage with elements of the Italianate and Gothic Revival styles. It is located on a very large lot with a moderately dramatic hilltop setting. Despite various alterations and enlargements, the house retains its National Register eligibility as a landmark in the parish seat of Arcadia.

The house began as a five bay central hall plan galleried cottage two rooms deep with a fairly massive hip roof. There was also a rear "L" wing with its own gallery. In 1929 the house received the following alterations: (1) The front part of the central hall was incorporated into one of the front rooms to form an enlarged parlor. A wall was removed and a doorway was relocated so as to give access to the remaining back half of the central hall. This work was carefully done using original details, and thus the change is not apparent to the casual observer. (2) A side wing was added. (3) Two dormers were added to the previously dormer-less roofline. (4) The rear room opposite the "L" wing was extended back a few feet. (5) All of the front gallery columns were replaced with plain square posts. The original pilasters at each end of the front gallery wall were left, and thus it is possible to determine the original appearance of the columns. An interesting aspect of this enlargement program is that the original Downingesque Gothic inspired cornice was painstakingly copied on the new portions of the house.

In 1987-88 the house was once again renovated and enlarged. Principal changes include: (1) The construction of a second rear wing, thus creating a courtyard. This new wing also duplicates the original cornice. (2) The addition of two massive octagonal turrets to the rear elevation (one at the end of the new wing and one at the end of the original wing). (3) The moving of one of the two surviving Italianate mantels to a new location in the house. (4) The conversion of a rear room into a two story atrium under a shed roof ceiling. This involved the insertion of a large Palladian window on the rear elevation. (5) The installation of new cornices. (6) The duplication (due to rot) of the bolection moldings on the dado in the dining room. (7) The installation of a new mantel in the atrium.

It should be noted that none of this recent prodigious architectural growth is visible from the front of the house. Moreover, many of the salient features of the original period of construction remain. These include: (1) The four French doors which open onto the front gallery. (2) The original front and rear doorways with their transoms and side lights. (3) The basic mass of the house with its gallery and hip roof. (4) The aforementioned Downingesque cornice which consists of a repeating pattern of decorative pierced cruciform cuts. (5) The principal Italianate mantel, which features chamfered pilasters with ornamentally cut boards resembling jabots, heavy scroll brackets, richly molded panels, and a paneled and truncated keystone. (6) The secondary Italianate mantel (installed elsewhere), which features a simpler keystone and chamfered column arrangement. (7) The richly molded Italianate paneled dado in the front rooms of the original portion of the house. (8) The copious intricate and bold Italianate moldings around the windows and doors in the original portion of the house. (9) The paneled doors and transoms in the original portion of the house.

Assessment of Integrity:

Despite the admittedly considerable history of alterations and additions the house has undergone, it still retains the features which establish its local architectural significance (see Item 8).

Non-contributing Element:

To the side of the house, attached by a covered walkway, is a modern garage. It is listed as a non-contributing element.

State significance of property, and justify criteria, criteria considerations, and areas and periods of significance noted above.

"The Hill" is of local architectural significance as an architectural landmark within the context of the parish seat of Arcadia.

In 1884 the town of Arcadia relocated about two miles in order to be on the newly constructed Vicksburg, Shreveport and Pacific Railroad. It is largely for this reason that the present town does not have an ancient architectural patrimony. Indeed, the collection of older buildings in Arcadia dates almost entirely from the twentieth century, with the vast majority being residences. The collection is modest by northwest Louisiana standards, consisting almost exclusively of nondescript cottages and bungalows. Indeed, there are very few houses that even reflect the Queen Anne Revival taste. It is against this background that the architectural significance of "The Hill" emerges. It is the only residence with an architectural history reflecting the pre-Queen Anne Revival period. Indeed, "The Hill" has a significant number of surviving pre-Queen Anne Revival features, including the Downingesque cornice, the Italianate mantels, the Italianate paneling, and the copious molded Italianate features such as door and window surrounds.

Historical Note:

"The Hill" was built in 1884 for Dr. F. C. Thornhill. In 1899 he sold it to John D. Anderson, and it remained in the Anderson family until 1929, when Lamar Ellis Ozley acquired the property. Mr. Ozley lived in the house until his death in 1986, and his son and family now live there.
