Describe present and historic physical appearance.

The South Camden Historic District is located in Camden, New Jersey. The district is roughly bordered by Jackson Street on the north, South Fourth Street on the west, Chelton Avenue on the south, and Railroad Avenue on the east. The principal north-south street is South Broadway, which has historically served as the district's principal commercial thoroughfare. The principal east-west street is Ferry Avenue, which is presently largely residential in character. The district's built environment clearly displays the evidence of a long history of repair, alteration, adaptation, and reuse. Many buildings have suffered some loss of original integrity.

The district consists of 803 buildings, of which 785 (97.8 percent) are considered contributing elements of the district. Buildings are considered contributing elements of the district if they were constructed during the district's period of significance. Buildings that have been altered from their original appearance are considered contributing elements because they provide a sense of the scale and density of the district during the period of significance.

The district is largely residential in character, with 708 of the district's buildings presently serving as residences (88.2 percent). The remainder of the district's built environment consists of 49 (6.1 percent) commercial buildings, 17 (2.2 percent) institutional buildings, 15 (1.9 percent) mixed use buildings, and 14 (1.7 percent) industrial buildings. The 18 non-contributing buildings within the district include 12 commercial buildings, 3 residences, and 3 industrial buildings. The majority of the non-contributing buildings are new construction, of which half are located along South Broadway, the major commercial street in the district, reflecting the continued viability of this commercial thoroughfare. Specific locations of non-contributing buildings are indicated on the accompanying historic district map.

The majority of the district's residential buildings were constructed between 1875 and 1925. These buildings include both frame and brick structures, doubles as well as rows. There are a few single family residences in the district, the majority of which are the result of the demolition of one half of a double. Almost all residential buildings in the district are two stories in height. A sprinkling of one and three-story buildings, most antedating 1875, are present.

State significance of property, and justify criteria, criteria considerations, and areas and periods of significance noted above.

The South Camden Historic District is a remarkably self-contained working class community dating from the second half of the nineteenth century. The district includes the houses of the area's residents, the commercial buildings in which they shopped, the churches and schools in which they worshipped and were educated, and the mills and factories in which they worked. Few individual properties within the district may be considered to possess architectural significance, but taken as an entity the district embodies the architectural experiences of the average working class citizen during the latter part of the nineteenth century. The district is thus both historical and architecturally significant on account of its typicality.

The district meets National Register of Historic Places significance Criteria A, B, and C. The development of the district as a residential suburb of industrial Camden and Gloucester City, and later as an working class residential neighborhood (the community planning and development area of significance) constitutes an association with the "broad patterns of our history" described under Criteria A. The important role that industrialist Howland Croft, and his Linden Worsted Mill, played in the district's development (the industry area of significance) provides the district with an association to "persons significant in our past" described under Criteria B. The buildings designed by locally significant architects John D'Arcy, George W. Hewitt, Jeremiah O'Rourke, and Edward Hazelhurst, provide additional associations with significant persons. The architectural integrity of the district, the numerous examples of the evolution of rowhouse design, and the individually significant buildings designed by professional architects "embody the distinctive characteristics of a type. ..." and satisfy Criteria C.

Development of the area encompassed by the South Camden Historic District began about 1851. In that year the Kaighns Point Land Company purchased a

The South Camden Historic District is roughly bounded by the Conrail railroad right-of-way on the east, Chelton Avenue on the south, the rear boundary lines of the properties fronting on South Fourth Street on the west, and the rear boundary lines of the properties fronting on Jackson Street on the north.

The district is located in the City of Camden, Camden County, New Jersey.

The vast majority of the district's frame houses are located north of Ferry Avenue, with the densest concentration along Ferry Avenue itself. This area was developed in the early 1850s, about twenty years prior to the general platting of building lots south of Ferry Avenue. The frame houses within the district are generally small, rectangular buildings with shallow gabled roofs. Most were erected as doubles, although some rows, particularly 433-439 Jackson Street (Photograph 1) are evident. Ornamentation is generally limited to bracketed wood, and in a few rare instances pressed metal cornices and, most notably at 601, 605, 607, 611, and 613 Jackson Street, bracketed door hoods. These buildings were probably originally sided with clapboards; however, virtually all of the district's frame houses have been resided with aluminum or vinyl siding, permastone, asbestos or asphalt shingles, or other materials. Traces of clapboards or shingles are occasionally evident beneath later coverings.

A notable exception to the concentration of frame residences in the northern portion of the district is a series of five double houses located on the east side of South Fourth Street in the 1900 block between Emerald and Winslow Streets. These buildings, constructed prior to 1877, are two-story gable-roofed homes with simple bracketed cornices. At the time of their construction they stood at the far southern end of the Stockton development.

The district's frame houses are associated with the area's earliest period of development, when the Kaighns Point Land Company promoted the newly laid out Centreville as a suburban refuge on the southern edge of Camden and north of Gloucester City. Several frame buildings within the district postdate the annexation of the district into the City of Camden as the city's Eighth Ward in 1871, but these are exceptions to the rule. In general the district's frame houses reflect an effort to promote the area as a suburban development. The scale and materials of the buildings and the extant observable details all indicate that these houses conformed, in general, to vernacular building styles, with nods to A. J. Downing, the Carpenter Gothic, and Italianate influences.

By far the majority of the residences within the district are constructed of brick. These buildings largely postdate 1875 and are associated with the rapid development of the area that occurred in the decades following its annexation. Brick houses exist as both doubles and rows, with the majority of the doubles located north of Ferry Avenue and constructed prior to 1900.

Among the earliest brick residences in the district are the small doubles located at the southern end of the district in the 1900 block of Fillmore Street (Photograph 30). Constructed ca. 1875, these buildings are distinguished by their placement on their lots. The individual buildings are set well back from the street and are provided with generous side yards. The majority of these buildings have been extensively altered by the application of new siding materials, the removal or obscuring of the original metal cornices, and changes to the original fenestration patterns.

There are several notable examples of brick rowhouse construction within the district. The twenty-three-unit row constructed along the west side of South Fourth Street between Van Hook and Jasper Streets ca. 1900 (1715-1759 South Fourth Street) is perhaps the finest example of the late-nineteenth and early-twentieth century rows built in South Camden (Photograph 10). The buildings are two bays wide and two stories in height, with flat or shed roofs. Ornamentation is limited to a corbeled and dentiled brick cornice that extends the entire length of the row and marble stoops. Window openings are segmentally arched with stone sills and brick lintels. The original sash appear to have been two-overtwo wood double-hung units. The original entry doors, some of which are extant, included an ornate Palladian light.

The rowhouses constructed in the district ca. 1915 are more architecturally sophisticated than those constructed prior to that date. The earlier buildings have a flat quality to their street facades that is only broken by the paired stoops leading from the sidewalk to the front entries. Post-1915 rowhouses are characterized by deeply recessed front porches and projecting second story bays. Variations in the ornamentation and materials used in the construction of these buildings is apparent, although the basic form of the design remains clearly identifiable. These variations include both brick and pressed metal cornices and metal and wooden bays. Excellent examples of this rowhouse style may be found along the 2000 block of Arlington Street (Photographs 35 and 36), the 400 blocks of Viola and Winslow Streets (Photographs 27, 28, and 32), and the 1800 block of South Sixth Street (Photograph 18). Because of the late date of their construction, buildings of this style are concentrated in the southern portion of the district.

Commercial buildings comprise a relatively small percentage of the district's built environment, with the exception of the corner stores constructed at the ends of nearly all rows erected after 1880. South Broadway served as the district's principal commercial thoroughfare and, accordingly, has the highest concentration of buildings erected specifically for commercial purposes (Photographs 15 and 20). In general these buildings closely resemble the residential architecture described above. The majority are two to three-story brick buildings with flat roofs, pressed metal cornices, and wood or metal storefronts, the latter generally altered by subsequent renovations. Projecting second story bays are also characteristic of the commercial buildings along South Broadway, although these bays indicate the presence of living quarters above the streetlevel commercial spaces.

The most notable commercial buildings within the district are the South Camden Trust Company Building (Photograph 14), erected at the southeast corner of South Broadway and Ferry Avenue in 1926, and the Star Theater (Photograph 29), located at the northeast corner of South Broadway and Viola Streets ca. 1910. The Star Theater is perhaps the more significant building, being a rare surviving example of an early twentieth century movie theatre. It consists of a motion picture theatre and a series of small commercial storefronts with apartments above. The building is of brick construction, with wood, rectangular, second story bays and an imposing pressed metal cornice stamped with the legend "THE STAR" above the theatre entry. Stylistically, the building differs little from the other commercial buildings erected along South Broadway during this period. Its cornice and large projecting entry canopy provide the only evidence of its novel function.

The South Camden Trust Company Building occupies a prominent location on the principal intersection in the district. Although typical of the Neo-classical bank buildings constructed throughout the nation during the first decades of the twentieth century, the building is a major presence in streetscape of South Broadway. It has been nominated to the National Register of Historic Places as part of the Camden Financial, Legal, Land Title, and Insurance Building resource nomination. Erected in 1926 by contractor James W. Draper, the Neo-classical one and two-story trapezoidal-plan building has a granite base with limestone walls and terra cotta ornamentation. Ornamentation includes an elaborate terra cotta cornice with dentils, brackets, and egg-and-dart moldings surmounted by a stone

balustrade. A bulletin case and clock originally occupied the chamfered northwest corner of the building.

The district has several major institutional buildings. The most imposing, architecturally, is the Church of the Sacred Heart (Photograph 13), located at the intersection of South Broadway, Ferry Avenue, and Jasper Street. Erected between 1886 and 1887, from plans by Newark, New Jersey architect Jeremiah O'Rourke, the Romanesque style building is constructed of randomly-coursed rough brownstone and has a steeply pitched gable roof clad with slate. The main building entry is through a three-story bell tower centered on the east facade.

The Church of the Sacred Heart complex also includes a Second Empire style stone rectory, a two-story brick convent, and a two-story brick and limestone school building constructed in 1925 (Photograph 23). These buildings occupy the majority of the block bounded by Ferry Avenue and Jasper and South Fourth Streets, constituting a major presence at a prominent location within the district.

The John W. Mickle School Annex (Photograph 7), erected at the southwest corner of South Sixth and Van Hook Streets in 1925 constitutes the second largest institutional building in the district. The original Mickle Grammar School, constructed on the east side of Fillmore Street between Van Hook Street and Ferry Avenue in 1875 from designs prepared by architect Stephen Decatur Button, was destroyed ca. 1935. A connecting corridor originally linked the surviving annex to the north facade of the original building. The Annex is a three-story brick building with limestone trim constructed in the Neo-Classical style. Separate entries for boys and girls are clearly demarcated on the building.

The Camden Fire Department Firehouse (Photograph 21) located at 1813 South Broadway is a significant institutional building in the southern portion of the district. Erected in 1889, the firehouse is a two-story brick building with stone trim. A pressed metal and brick cornice and a gabled roof parapet add distinction to the building.

Our Saviour Church and its associated parish house, located at the southeast corner of South Broadway and Viola, constitute the last major institutional building located within the district. The main church building is an excellent

example of small-scale Gothic architecture designed by noted Philadelphia-based architect George W. Hewitt in 1880. The building is constructed of rusticated brownstone, with a steeply pitched gabled roof clad in slate. A stone belltower with open belfry is attached to the main block adjacent to the building entry. The parish house, a modest two-story stucco-clad building located south of the church, was erected in 1892 from designs prepared by architect Edward P. Hazelhurst.

The industrial complexes that employed the area's residents are largely located outside the district's boundaries, with a few notable exceptions. The Linden Worsted Mills (Photographs 33 and 34) occupy the entire block bounded by South Fourth, Winslow, South Broadway, and Jefferson Streets. Erected in 1885, with major additions designed by architect John D'Arcy in 1890 and 1895, the Linden Worsted Mill complex is an excellent example of late nineteenth century textile mill construction. The complex includes a three-story brick main building that extends almost the entire length of the block along Jefferson Street, a series of secondary buildings, and two brick towers, one of six stories and one of four stories.

Other industrial buildings within the district include: the ca. 1926 Mack Truck Service Center (Photograph 39) located on the south side of Jefferson Avenue between Fillmore and South Sixth Streets; the ca. 1915 Samuel M. Langston Company complex, which includes buildings on both sides of South Sixth Street between Viola Street and Jefferson Avenue; the General Gas Mantle Building, erected at the southeast corner of Jefferson and South Fourth Streets ca. 1915; the ca. 1890 Cottrill & Wolfenden Stocking Factory (Photograph 6) at the northwest corner of Van Hook and Railroad Streets, which operated for many years as the plant of the Clement 'Coverall' Company, manufacturers of paint and varnish; a former wagon works, presently used as an auto boby repair shop, which operated at 429-433 Van Hook Street as early as 1891 (Photograph 9); and the former slaughterhouse of W. Mills & Brothers, which began operating at 501 Jackson Street as early as 1886.

All of these mills and factories are relatively modest brick buildings, with the exception of the substantial Langston Company complex and the concrete block Mack Truck Service Center. The Langston complex includes one and two-story brick buildings with sawtoothed roofs and industrial metal window sash. The Langston Company manufactured papermaking machinery at this complex.

In summary, the South Camden Historic District consists largely of brick rowhouses erected between 1875 and 1925. The residential fabric of the district also includes brick and frame double houses. Commercial buildings within the district are concentrated along South Broadway, with small groceries originally occupying the end units of many rows. The highest concentration of commercial buildings is in the vicinity of the district's principal intersection at South Broadway and Ferry Avenue. Institutional buildings, including churches, schools, and government buildings, are also concentrated along South Broadway. The earliest of these buildings, erected in the 1880s indicate the period in which the district began to become a viable and independent neighborhood. Industrial buildings in the district are concentrated at the fringes of the area. These buildings, particularly the significant Linden Worsted Mills complex are representative of the work environment of many of the district's residents.

tract extending from Ferry Street to Jackson Street east to near Evergreen Cemetery from Colonel Isaac W. Mickle and various Mickle heirs. The Mickle family had held this land since 1696, when it was granted to Archibald Mickle as part of a larger tract that extended from Kaighn's Run to Newton Creek.¹

The Kaighns Point Land Company, a partnership of James D. Crowley, Thomas Phillips, George F. Miller, and William Jones, began operations in 1849, with the purchase of a large tract of land west of the Camden and Woodbury Railroad Railroad tracks (the present Conrail tracks that form the eastern boundary of the district). The Mickle purchase two years later represented the firm's second large scale venture into South Camden.²

The Kaighns Point Land Company laid out town lots on the Mickle tract, which the firm dubbed Centreville, later changed to Stockton. The new development straddled Broadway (laid out in 1763), halfway between the thriving industrial cities of Camden and Gloucester, hence the name Centerville. Ferry Avenue (laid out in 1820), the principal east-west street in the new development, provided direct access to the Kaighn's Point Ferry (incorporated in 1809) to Philadelphia. The adjacent rail line also provided a transportation link to Camden, Gloucester, and Woodbury.

At the time the tract was platted and surveyed the area consisted largely of cornfields, while oak forest dominated the area south of Ferry Avenue. Development proved relatively slow, despite astute business choices, such as the donation of land on Van Hook Street near 6th Street for the Stockton Baptist Society.³

The Baptist Society later proved something of a thorn in the side of the Land Company, protesting against William Jones' application for a liquor license

for his establishment at the corner of Ferry Avenue and South Broadway. Jones apparently threatened to take back the land donated to the Society as punishment for this affront, but cooler heads within the Land Company's ownership prevailed. Jones' saloon and the local Baptists both continued to exist within the district.

In 1871 the City of Camden annexed the area encompassed by the district as the city's 8th Ward. The annexation resulted in the extension of city services, including water, gas, and street railway lines, into the district, which initiated a period of rapid growth and expansion. The Manufacturers' Land Improvement Company, successor to the Kaighns Point Land Company, and other developers acquired land south of Ferry Avenue from the Isaac W. Mickle Estate and began to lay out lots and build houses. At the time of the annexation the district's name was changed from Stockton to South Camden.

The earliest properties within the district reflect a different aesthetic than those erected after about 1885. The earliest buildings appear to represent an effort to develop the area as a suburban enclave located conveniently near downtown Camden and Gloucester Cities. The oldest houses in the district are almost exclusively of frame, rather than brick, construction and are overwhelmingly laid out as single family residences or duplexes, rather than rows. This type of development is evident on both sides of the 1900 block of Fillmore Street and on the east side of South Fourth Street between Emerald and Winslow. The Fillmore Street duplexes are set back on their lots, separating the houses from the street, and are surrounded by generous side yards. The South Fourth Street houses retain the side yards, but are set flush with the street. Isolated examples of this house type are also evident north of Ferry Avenue, but later construction of brick rowhouses and the demolition of numerous buildings somewhat obscures the original design.

The annexation of the area into the City of Camden, and the concomitant provision of essential city services, attracted a number of important industries to the area. The presence of these mills and factories rapidly

transformed the area from a suburban development into a working class neighborhood. The largest industrial building within the district is the former Linden Worsted Mills at the northwest corner of South Broadway and Jefferson. Howland Croft and Herbert Priestly established their worsted mill at this location in 1885. In 1886 the mill contained 7,000 spindles and employed 400 men and women. Camden architect John D'Arcy oversaw construction of additions to the mill in 1890 and 1895, and by 1902 the complex had attained its present size and configuration.⁵

Croft was born in Yorkshire, England in 1839 and worked for a time in the worsted mill owned by Priestly's father. In 1867 Croft emigrated to Philadelphia. He worked for about twelve years as a superintendent in the city's largest worsted mills, and in 1879 established Croft, Midgely & Rommel, New Jersey's first worsted mill, at Front and Linden Streets in Camden. In 1884 Croft bought out his partners and brought in Herbert Priestly. Soon after the firm relocated to the South Camden site. Priestly died in 1886 and in 1889 Croft brought his sons into the firm, which reorganized as Howland Croft, Sons & Company.⁶

The industrial enterprises located within or immediately adjacent to the district may be classified into three broad categories. Textile mills concentrated at the southern end of the district. These included the previously described Linden Worsted Mills, the worsted suitings mill of A. Priestly & Company, erected at the southeast corner of Jefferson and South Sixth Streets in 1886, and a small hosiery mill, later converted to a manufactory of glazed leather, and later again to a paint and varnish

factory, located on the north side of Van Hook Street east of South Sixth Street.

Chemical works concentrated on the southeastern boundary of the district. These included J. C. Dunn, Jr. & Company's floor oil cloth factory, established in 1882 at Seventh and Jefferson Streets and the dye works of R. H. Comey Company located across Jefferson from Dunn's factory. Additionally, the Keystone Chemical Works operated a large plant on the Delaware River at approximately Jefferson Street prior to 1886.

At the northeast corner of South Broadway and Jefferson Streets a small concentration of firms associated with cattle and leather established themselves. Isaac Ferris started a shoe factory at this location in 1882, and in 1884 the Kifferty Morocco Leather Works were established just north of Ferris' factory. By 1886 a slaughterhouse owned by W. Hills & Brother operated immediately east of Ferris' plant.

In addition to the mills and factories described above, a number of other industries operated within close proximity to the district. As with the mills and factories located within or adjacent to the district, these plants attracted workers to the area. They were all located within easy walking distance, or a short streetcar ride, of the district. These included the enormous New York Ship Building Company yards erected on the Delaware River

just south of the district in 1899, the somewhat smaller Dialogue Iron Works shipyard established in 1850 north of the district on the Delaware, the large Eavenson & Levering fabric soap factory, located immediately northwest of the district, the Camden White Lead Works established just northeast of the district ca. 1900, the massive Miller & Rittenhouse Licorice Works established on the Delaware between Jefferson and Chelton Streets in 1900, and the Camden City Brewery, established just south of the district ca. 1905. 10

Review of historic maps suggests that the establishment of industrial plants in the vicinity of the district is intimately associated with the area's transformation into a working class residential neighborhood. By 1890 the northern portion of the district, above Ferry Avenue, had been fairly densely developed. The frame houses constructed prior to 1877 were intermixed with new brick rowhouses, generally of fewer than six individual units. The small size of the rows reflects the presence of earlier buildings on the blocks, and the need for developers to build on the interstices between existing structures.

By 1890 development had also spread south along South Broadway, the area's major commercial thoroughfare. Historic maps indicate a large number of residences along South Broadway, with small retail establishments clustered near the corners of the blocks. Principal buildings constructed during this period include the two major extant religious buildings in the district, Our Saviour's Church, erected at the southeast corner of South Broadway and Viola between 1880 and 1882 from designs prepared by prominent Philadelphia architect George Hewitt, and the massive brownstone Church of the Sacred Heart, erected in 1886 from the designs of Jeremiah O'Rourke, that dominates

the intersection of Ferry Avenue and South Broadway.¹¹ Another significant building constructed along the southern reaches of South Broadway during this period is the Camden City Fire Department's Engine House No. 3, erected at 1813 South Broadway in 1889. The construction of these two large churches and this fire house testify to the area's growth and prosperity. The architectural scale and quality of the churches indicates that the area's population had become prosperous enough to finance the construction of substantial religious institutions, while the presence of the fire house suggests both the city government's commitment to the recently annexed neighborhood and the fact that development of the area had advanced to the point that city government felt justified in stationing a fire company in the midst of the district.

The residential development of the district continued apace during the first decades of the twentieth century. As builders began to construct houses in the southern portions of the district, in areas previously undeveloped, the frame houses and small brick rows of early periods gave way to block-long rows of identical residences. The most impressive of these rows occupies the west side of South Fourth Street between Van Hook and Jasper Streets. Consisting of thirty individual units, one of which has been demolished, the row was erected ca. 1900. It is representative of residential construction throughout the district during the last decade of the nineteenth century and the first decade of the twentieth.

After 1906 a new style of rowhouse appeared in the district, characterized by deeply recessed porches and projecting second story bays. This design represents the culmination of residential development within the district. Good examples of this residential style are scattered throughout the southern and eastern portions of the district, particularly on the 400 block of Winslow Street and the 1800 block of South Sixth Street.

Twentieth century commercial development continued to be strongly linked to South Broadway. Major commercial projects constructed between 1900 and 1930 include the South Camden Trust Company Building, erected at the southeast corner of South Broadway and Ferry Avenue in 1926, the Star Theatre constructed ca. 1910 at the northeast corner of South Broadway and Viola Street, and an automobile showroom and garage, erected between 1906 and 1926 at the northwest corner of South Broadway and Winslow Street.

With the Great Depression, development in the district largely came to a halt. World War II brought a degree of prosperity to the district, as the various industrial plants in the area expanded operations. Following 1945, as major industries moved out of Camden, the district and its residents fell upon economic hard times. At present many buildings within the district are in deteriorated condition, and the once continuous rows of working class housing are interrupted by vacant lots.

Despite the deterioration that has resulted from neglect and economic hardtimes, the South Camden Historic District remains a significant and unique area within the City of Camden. Initially developed as a residential suburb, and transformed into a working class residential neighborhood by the establishment of a significant industrial presence in the immediately surrounding area, the district contains elements of both an early midnineteenth century residential suburb and a late nineteenth century working class neighborhood. The fact that the district did not become a part of the City of Camden until 1871 contributes to its unique architectural character. After annexation, frame construction was halted as a result of the City's 1853 fire code. Buildings erected in the district before 1871 tend to be of frame construction, while those built after annexation are mostly of brick.

Unlike other areas of the city, the district did not become intensively developed until the last quarter of the nineteenth century. As a result, the building stock is significantly later than that in the city's other working class neighborhoods. The variation between the district and other areas of Camden is perhaps best illustrated by the substantial numbers of early twentieth century rowhouses, some with associated garages (such as those on the 400 block of Van Hook Street, Photograph), located within the district. Other areas of the city, developed as working class neighborhoods

at an earlier date, did not have the physical space necessary to permit significant residential development during the twentieth century. The South Camden Historic District constitutes a rare opportunity, within the limits of the City of Camden, to observe both nineteenth century suburban and twentieth century working class residential architecture.

The framework of the district is provided by the blocks and rows of residences. Within this framework are a number of individually significant buildings associated with the commercial, institutional, industrial, and religious life of the community. These buildings include the Linden Worsted Mills, the Church of the Sacred Heart and Our Saviour's Church, the Star Theatre, Firehouse No. 3, the South Camden Trust Company, and the Mickle School Annex. Incorporated into the fabric of the community, these buildings constituted local landmarks and centers of activity. They remain distinctive elements within the district and illustrate the fact that during the late nineteenth and early twentieth centuries the area encompassed by the South Camden Historic District constituted a vibrant self-contained community.

Boundary Justification

The boundaries of the South Camden Historic District consist largely of physical separations between the district and surrounding areas. The Conrail railroad right-of-way formes the eastern boundary. The south side of Chelton Avenue, the southern boundary, consists of post-1945 commercial and industrial buildings that are not related to the historic district. West of the western boundary, which largely conforms to the rear boundary line of the

properties fronting the west side of South Fourth Street, are vacant lots. North of the north boundary, which generally conforms to the north boundary line of the properties fronting the north side of Jackson Street, are major industrial complexes and vacant parcels, that do not form a cohesive part of the South Camden neighborhood.

The inventory is arranged alphabetically by street name and, for a single street, by street address. The information consists of the street address, the City of Camden Tax Parcel Number (Block and Lot number), a brief description of the property, and a notation identifying photographs of the building taken during July 1989. The initials are those of the photographer. The number that follows consists of the roll number/frame number. Photographs and negatives are on file at the Camden Redevelopment Authority, Camden, New Jersey.

Buildings are also identified as significant, contributing, or noncontributing elements within the district. Buildings are considered contributing elements if they were constructed during the district's period of significance. Buildings that have been altered from their original appearance are considered contributing elements because they provide a sense of the scale and density of the district during the period of significance.

Constructed in stages, with building on site by 1885, complex largely in present form by 1902. Significant.
