DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

This building, now used for religious purposes, was originally built as a residence c. 1860. Exhaustive research has not provided specific documentation of a building date, but the form of the house and various indirect evidence suggests a mid-19th century date. The house has been moved twice, most recently in 1932.

The house is of wood frame construction on a stone foundation, with dimensions of 23' x 55'. It is one story, with front-gable orientation of the main block, and has a flat-roofed rear wing. The gable ends of the main block feature bracketted parapets and have what appear to be short, square panelled posts at each corner. On the front elevation, the parapet rises to a sharply-pointed false gable edged with decorative vergeboards and a small center pendant. Beneath this is a single, round-topped window set below a triangular molding, the pitch of which repeats that of the false gable.

Across the front is a wooden veranda, with chamfered, bracketted posts. Beneath the roof, the facade is divided into three bays, with entrance to right of center. The door and window surrounds feature shouldered architrave trim and denticular cornices. Windows on the side elevations of the main block have plain surrounds. On the west side, the "windows" are actually floor length, sliding doors. On the east side, toward the rear of the main block, is a projecting rectangular bay, the windows of which have segmental-arched tops similar to those of the large roof dormer on the same side. On the west side are two smaller dormers, with gable roofs, and decorative aprons in the gable ends, above single round-topped windows.

The rear section of the house has bracketted eaves, and 4/4 double hung sash windows topped with simple cornices.

The interior room arrangement has been modified, with original walls removed to make one large meeting room that occupies 2/3 of the main floor plan. The rear portion of the building contains a reading room and restrooms.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

The significance of this house lies in its singular visual character, which is established principally through the picturesque treatment of the gable ends and particularly the pointed false gable on the front, the latter suggestive of Downing's Gothic cottage detail . The house is a study in small details, with its assortment of window treatments, dormers, and the projecting bay. It is known locally both as a visual oddity and as among Grinnel's oldest houses. For these various reasons, the house deserves recognition as a most unusual element in the built environment of the community.


Charles H. Spencer is believed to have been the original owner of this house. He was the original title holder for the lot, and local residents and historical accounts attribute the house to him,with an approximate date of 1860. Spencer came to Grinnell in 1856, and soon became active in local banking and real estate. He was killed in a Colorado Springs railroad accident in 1892.

The only definite documentation for the first relocation of the house is an 1898 fire insurance map that shows the house at 1010 Spring Street. It appears, from city directories, to have been used as a rental property, until purchase and final relocation by the Christian Scientists in 1932. While at 1010 Spring Street, the house lost a side porch, and the projecting bay (according to the fire insurance maps) was made smaller. Once moved to its present location, several interior walls were removed, but the exterior has been left intact.
