Summary				

The Immaculate Conception Church of Sparks, Nevada is an attractive, one-and-one-half story, brick structure influenced by the Mediterranean Revival style. The building was designed by the prominent Nevada architect, Frederick Joseph DeLongchamps and built in 1932. The structure has served continuously as a church and is in excellent condition. The original facade is somewhat obscured by the addition of a small, one story vestibule and porch. This sensitive 1970 addition provides handicap access and continues the major architectural elements of the building: the red brick exterior, the semi-circular arched openings, and the red tiled roof. The majority of the original aspects of the building remains intact.

Exterior

The Immaculate Conception Church is a cruciform-in-plan building resting on a brick foundation. Its uniform, red brick exterior is laid in common bond with a header course every seven courses. The building is topped by a medium pitched, red tiled, gabled roof which overhangs the building's walls slightly. The gable ends of the building face the street and the alley. Five, stepped semi-circular arched windows, separated by columns with cubiform capitals, pierce the upper portion of the facade and light the church balcony. A cross projects from the peak of the facade gable.

Attached to the facade and to one side are additions made in 1970: a small, one story, brick clad, shed roofed, entry vestibule and porch with semi-circular arched openings; a small, one story, brick clad, shed roofed wing on the north side of the church, off center to the front. Access into the building is now by both stairway and ramp.

Side walls are articulated by pilasters with cubiform capitals. Five sets of paired, semi-circular arched, stained glass windows pierce each side wall and illuminate the nave. These windows have a simple, radiating brick surround and splayed sill. Transept windows are multi-light and rectangular.

A tall, thick, stepped, gabled parapet capped with red tile rises from the rear wall of the church and serves as a belfry with the bell contained within a semi-circular arched opening. Attached to one side of this rear wall is a tall chimney. Three, tall and narrow, semi-circular arched windows provide rear wall fenestration.

Interior

This small church is simple and elegant. The nave is entered through a small hall with a room to the north and to the south a staircase to the balcony. The nave has a slightly vaulted ceiling, plastered walls, and carpet on the floor. Rows of wooden pews from one central aisle. The nave is decorated with ten stained glass windows in paired arrangements on each side wall. Six original lighting fixtures hang from the ceiling. Two recessed semi-circular arched niches holding figures of Jesus and Mary flank a semi-elliptical compound arch separating the nave and chancel. The balcony is lighted by five, stepped, stained glass windows.

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The Immaculate Conception Church is eligible for the National Register of Historic Places under criterion A as the oldest, extant Catholic Church in Sparks and one of the first Catholic churches built in the state after Nevada was granted diocesan status by Pope Pius XI on March 27, 1931, and also under criterion C, as one of the many outstanding works of Nevada's premier architect, Frederick Joseph DeLongchamps (1882-1969), who designed this building in the Mediterranean Revival style. The Mediterranean Revival style is relatively rare in northern Nevada. DeLongchamps is known for the magnitude of his work, the variety of his styles, and the span of his influence.

The Catholic Church had a long history in the Great Basin, predating even the creation of the Nevada Territory in 1861. first the Comstock Mining District with its famed Virginia City became the center of development of the Church, dominated at the time by Irish and Mexican immigrants. Slumps are endemic to mining, however, and growth in the Church was almost always followed by declines. New groups of Italians, Basques and others changed the character of the Church. Following the stock market crash of 1929, the Nevada State Legislature eased its divorce requirements and legalized gambling, creating a firmer foundation The creation of a Nevada diocese occurred for economic growth. just when events ensured that Nevada population and economy would never again decline: the 1930 population of Nevada was 91,058 with 8,500 catholics.

The first Catholic Church of Sparks was built in 1905 at 729 F Street. Father Horgan headed the drive to raise money for the church, a wood frame building. This structure burned on Easter Sunday of 1930. After the fire, Father O'Connor raised the funds for the present brick building. The Church was designed by DeLongchamps, a Catholic, who also designed the Saint Thomas Aquinas Parish and School in Reno in 1931. The Immaculate Conception Church was dedicated on February 22, 1932. building was constructed for approximately \$20,000 and has a The rebuilding of the Immaculate seating capacity of 400. Conception Church after the fire coincides, therefore, with a time of growth within the Church and the state. It occurred at the beginning of the "Modern Era" as defined in Dr. Kevin Rafferty's chapter on the Catholic Church planned for publication in the third edition of the Nevada Comprehensive Preservation Plan.

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The Immaculate Conception Church contributes to the City of Spark's architectural and historical heritage. It is similar in scale to the other commercial and religious buildings from this period in Sparks. It is one of two Mediterranean Revival style buildings in this community. The other is the Sparks Justice Court (1931), also designed by DeLongchamps and listed on the National Register of Historic Places. Other Frederick J. DeLongchamps buildings in Sparks include three schools constructed between 1916 and 1938.

As mentioned above, DeLongchamps was very prolific; his architecture firm was responsible for the designs of over 500 buildings as well as numerous additions and alterations to existing structures. Although the architect favored Neo-Classical designs, many other styles, including Gothic Revival, Moderne, and American Colonial architecture can be found in his work. Brick was a favorite building material. Further information can be located in the "Thematic Nomination of the Architecture of Frederick J. DeLongchamps," listed on the National Register on August 8, 1986.

In 1938 Father William Devlin purchased the bell from the firehouse of Virginia City for \$75 and added it to the rear wall of the church. In 1970, the stained glass windows, the front vestibule and porch, and the air conditioning were added under the direction of Father James McGrath. Nevertheless, the structure retains its historic integrity.
