

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#### Describe the present and original (if known) physical appearance

Built in 1880, the Hedge Block is a particularly fine example of the Victorian Gothic commercial style. Its rich ornamentation and massive presence render it unique in downtown Burlington. The structure occupies a half block on what is now a pedestrian mall in the midst of the central business district. The streets are a grid pattern that runs parallel to the Mississippi River four blocks away. Although similar in mass and height to nearby buildings, which date from the 1870s to the 1910s, the Hedge Block stands out by virtue of its corner location, variety of building materials and heavy, irregular orientation.

The local limestone used on the main facade features a chamfered one-bay corner, a three-bay gabled portion with a steeply pitched parapet and irregular towers flanking the gable, and then a smaller gabled fifth bay that marks the ground floor entrance to the second floor. In original condition, this heavy Gothic-arched entrance leads to steep stairs and the original second floor double doors inside. Segmentally arched and Gothic-arched hood molds having rounded pilasters surround tall narrow windows. Heavy piers separate windows, and heavy ornament projecting above the cornice further divides the design into units of three or four bays along Jefferson Street.

The brick facade along 4th Street is simpler and flatter than that of the front. Use of stone for keystones, hood molds, imposts, sills, small columns and belt courses creates a polychrome effect associated with the Victorican Gothic, especially when combined with the slate roof and terra cotta. The desired irregular outline is carried out through various window treatments, a variety of false gables (one has been removed), parapets and pilasters, and brick corbelling and stone dentils for the cornice. Only one of the five chimneys remain.

The Hedge Block was actually a combined effort on the part of four Burlington entrepreneurs to build commercial space on the site of the burned Lawrence House, and the plan of the structure reflects this multiple ownership and use. Each of three men owned a 20' frontage, and the fourth owned 27' on the corner. The building is generally separated in this manner with long-narrow stores on the ground floor and larger connected areas above. Pine woodwork having headblocks with bull's-eyes are found on these upper floors.

The greatest modifications have been periodic storefront remodeling. The most serious change involves removal of large, heavy stone columns at the corner entrance. A single circular display space now incongruously occupies the space beneath the chamfered corner. A brick parapet and fire stairs from the 4th Street facade as well as iron cresting have also been removed. Two side and four windows on 4th Street have been enclosed.

Statement of Significance (in one paragraph)

Thomas Hedge, Sr., E.H. Carpenter, John M. Gregg and Wesley Bonar joined together to build the Hedge Block as an investment. They hired local architect Charles A. Dunham to provide the design. Dunham designed the Hedge Block when he had been practicing for fifteen years. After a ten-year apprenticeship with Burlington architect A.G. Bassett, Dunham established his own office (for a time in partnership with Mr. Jordon) in 1865; he was active until 1907, designing a variety of buildings in a variety of styles ranging from the Victorian Gothic to the Stick Style. Since several of his larger commissions (Warren County Courthosue, Burlington High School, Old Main at Iowa State) are not extant, the Hedge Block emerges as an even more important representative of this Iowa architect's work.

The ground floor shops first housed Naudain Brothers dry goods store and A.A. Perkins silverware, china and glass shop. It is unclear what was the original use of the remaining space. Between 1880 and 1913, a business college (Orchard City Business College, later called Elliott's Business College) occupied the second and third floors of the corner portion. Thomas Hedge, Jr., an Andover, Yale and Columbia Law School graduate, had his law offices in the building as well. Later president of his father's lumber business, Hedge went on to represent the district in Congress.

Thomas Hedge, Sr., was an early and successful Burlington businessman. He started his commercial career in that city in 1843 and by 1866 was an owner of the wholesale lumber company, Gilbert, Hedge & Co. Hedge was an active promotor of the Burlington & Northwestern Railroad in the 1870s, serving as the company's first president.
