DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

The main post office, located at 144 Tichsnor Avenue in Auburn, Alabama, is in the central business district (CBD). No historically significant buildings were observed in the vicinity of this building.

This building was constructed in 1933 and opened for service on October 1, 1933. It is one of the most impressive postal facilities in the State of Alabama. The building is a one story structure with a basement and mezzanine floor. The first floor contains 10,736 gross square feet, the basement has 7121 square feet and the mezzanine has 545 net square feet. There was an expansion of the facility made in 1968 which added 3615 square feet on the first floor.

The exterior of the building is common red brick laid in a flemish bond style. The front facade has loggia arched case openings constructed with red brick. The style resembles Georgia Revival Architecture with heavy federal influence. The roof over the second story area is a Spanish clay tile hip roof, however, it is not visible except from about a block away and does not give a Spanish influence to the design. The windows are arched, double hung wood sash with 12/12 lights and recessed fan lights in the arch portion. There are four spiral type windows at the corners which are also double hung wood sash with 12/12 lights. All the lintels are plain constructed with cut granite. The are slipsill style, also constructed with cut granite. The sills coping and chimney cap are constructed with the material. About three feet below the cap is a frieze layer or belt made of granite with every third stone having a four leaf clover carved into it. The steps leading into the building are made of granite.

The interior of the building is also more impressive than most postal facilities. The service and box lobby have natural mahogany wainscotting with decorative trim on the top. The floors are a light brown terrazzo with a slightly darker brown terrazzo border.

The baseboard is Compania Light Rose Tennessee marble which is brownish in color. The wainscotting on the interior stairway leading to the basement is the same kind of marble. The plaster walls and louvers in the customer lobby are painted orange and blue which are the school colors of Auburn. There are six panels of very decorative louvers over the lock box and service counter. The postmaster has probably the most impressive door into his office of any postal facility in Alabama. It was constructed with carved natural mahogany with a decorative broken pediment with an urn in the center and supported by mahogany pilisters.

The workroom area has part asphalt plank floors and part hardwood parquet. The new addition part has painted concrete block walls and the original part has plaster walls with hardwood wainscotting. Ceilings throughout are acoustical tile and lighting is with stem mounted fluorescent fixtures.

The basement is about half finished for office space. The finished area has clay tile floors and plaster walls and ceilings over clay tile blocks. Due to moisture there is some pealing paint and the area is generally not very attractive. This area is mostly used for storage of equipment and records and is not in view of the general public.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

The Auburn Post Office was constructed during 1933 by Charles H. Barnes Construction Company of Logansport, Indiana. The Construction engineer for the government was Major H. G. Little. The facility was open for service on October 1, 1933. The supervising architect on the site was J. A. Wolevere. The cut stone contractor was Edward Edinger of Bedford, Indiana.

A substantial addition, costing \$195,000, was made to this building and completed on December 25, 1968. This added 3615 square feet to the first floor. This addition matches the original structure so well it is impossible to detect without very careful observation.

The postmasters serving in this facility are as follows:

The building is architecturally one of the more impressive postal facilities in the State of Alabama. Its design and construction features warrant consideration for nomination to the National Register.
