The Clinton D. Gilson Barn is a large, gambrel-roofed frame building built in 1892, and located in the vicinity of Hebron, Indiana. It is the dominant structure on the Gilson Farm, which also includes an extensively altered house and a machine shed, which are not a part of this nomination. A windmill was once located on the west end of the barn and an elevator on the east end.

Rectangular in shape, the barn is 80' long and 40' wide and consists of two levels, with a cupola at the center of the roof. The exterior of the barn is white gypsum siding, which has covered the original red barn siding since the 1950's. The original exterior included white trim along the edge of the roof and down the corners of the building.

The foundation is built of cut stone, which was hauled from Joliet Prison in Joliet, Illinois, according to Arthur Gilson, the owner's grandfather. The structure was built individual, 16' sections. in

There are two major entrances, large sliding doors located in the middle of the north and south sides. These sliding doors have been lowered from their original position. In addition, several small doors are located on the east and west sides. All entrances lead to the ground level of the barn.

On both the north and south facades there are seven original windows, and five on the east and west facades. They are pedimented, double-hung sash windows with six over six lights, and most are positioned on the lower half of the barn. A number of fixed sash windows with four over four lights were added in the 1950's.

The interior of the barn contains $12^{"} \times 12^{"}$ pegged beams. The main floor is at ground level and divided east and west into two sections. The east area was used for milk cows and is whitewashed; the west area housed horses and young cattle. The upper level consists of several havmow areas and still contains a hook used in the transporting of hay. Gas pipe for the original gas lamps is still in place; several lamps are in storage.

The gambrel roof has an overhang and is covered with cedar shake shingles that are overlaid by asphalt shingles on the north side. The cupola has windows facing east and west and shutters on the north and south. There are intersecting gables on the cupola, which has a row of metal trim on top where a weathervane and lightning rod were once located.

Statement of Significance (in one paragraph)

The Gilson Barn is significant as one of the largest and most elaborate barns in Porter County, and as a representation of the work of Clinton D. Gilson, the original owner and builder. The barn, which dominates the other structures on the farm, is 80' long, 40' wide, and 44' high. The height to the eaves is 27'. The barn took a year to build and was hand constructed in 16' sections and raised to position by use of a steam engine and wooden pulleys. The builder was a master craftsman and the boss of a construction crew, which traveled around the area building houses and barns. Using the latest technology, he also installed a windmill to grind feed, an elevator to transport hay to the haymows, and gas lamps and piping. All have been removed from the property except for the gas piping, and some of the lamps, which are in storage. Some of the barn's notable features are the 12" x 12" pegged beams, pedimented windows, and cupola.

In the past, the barn housed cows and horses, and the upper level held up to 100 tons of hay, which was transported to the mow by an elevator drawn by horses. In the 1950's and 1960's the barn housed laying hens. The Gilson farm has remained in the same family since before the barn was built, and some farm activity continues to the present day. The roof, cupola, and a portion of the foundation have deteriorated to a certain extent; however, there are plans to fully restore the barn.

Two other barns in Boone Township have been identified as works of Gilson and his crew. Neither of these, the Maplehurst Farm Barn and the Arthur Gilson Barn (built for Clinton D. Gilson's grandson) has the ornamental features found on the Gilson Barn.
