Describe the present and original (if known) physical appearance

This is a fine Neoclassical, 2-storied building with a rectangular plan. The south, or main facade has two terminal sections which laterally contain a doric portico supported by four columns and two half doric columns. Behind it are five great arches which span both floors. The hip roof is of red tiles. The exterior is painted light gray and white.

The floor plan is symmetrical on both floors. The first had a great hall that ran the full length of the building and is now divided into two, providing a vestibule area with book stacks behind. On each side of it there are reading rooms. The interior floor has been repaved with clay tiles and the reading rooms have been thoroughly modernized by eliminating moldings; carpets and hung acoustical ceilings were introduced. The vestibule and hall still retain most of their architectural details, with the metal book stacks installed as a free standing structure. Air conditioning ducts are ceiling hung and unobtrusive.

Access to the second floor is gained through two lateral staircases on each side of the stacks. The stairs still retain their original wooden balustrade, and the original paving is existent and partially visible under the sympathetic new material used for the 1966 restoration.

The second floor replicates the first, with an exhibit hall above the vestibule, reading rooms above the stacks and the west reading rooms underneath. The east reading room in the first floor is replaced by an auditorium in the floor above. The latter is significant in that it retains all the original architectural ornamentation.

The structure has not been properly maintained and is in fair condition.

Statement of Significance (in one paragraph)

The Biblioteca Carnegie was the first building built for the specific use of a public library in Puerto Rico. Its origins date to 1903 when the Biblioteca Insular de Puerto Rico was founded in Old San Juan. In 1914, Gov. Arthur Yager succeeded in getting a donation of \$100,000 from Andrew Carnegie, for the construction of a public library in San Juan. The building was designed and built by Ramón Carbia, a Puerto Rican engineer, in 1915. In 1917 the Government of Puerto Rico formally accepted the donation of the structure and moved the Insular library to these new headquarters, changing the name to Biblioteca Carnegie.

The library was originally controlled by a Board of Trustees appointed by the Governor with the approval of the Senate. In 1950 all the functions of said Board were transferred to the Secretary of Education, thus the public library services became part of the functions of the Department of Education.

The building itself reflects the influence of North American neoclassical tastes which became prevalent with the advent of US influence on the island. By its sheer size and very stately siting it is an impressive building, located on a strip composed of structures of majestic scale, several of which are being considered for National Register nomination.




