#### Describe the present and original (if known) physical appearance

The two-story Federal style frame dwelling is located on a knoll, on the west side of a ridge road, now State Highway 22. Mature cedar trees and crepe myrtle bushes screen the house from the road. The house was built in two stages. In 1840 a downstairs room surrounded by porches with a second story room above was built from logs floated down river from Wetumpka and split and hand adzed on the site. In 1842, the front section of two rooms below and two above, forming a T, was completed. The two parts were connected by a breezeway, now enclosed.

The five bay facade has clapboard siding except in the center by where shiplapped siding is used. Here a two level pedimented portico projects from the main block. The gable roof is seamed metal with exterior chimneys on each end of the T.

Square pilasters define the entrance bay, and the pediment is supported by round columns with Doric capitals on both levels. A simple wooden rail, Federal in style, encloses the porches. The replacements steps and porch floor are brick. The single entrance door is set in moulded trim with bullseye corner blocks. The four pane sidelights rest on a paneled spandrel and the transom is of an intercepted multi-pane pattern. The same form is repeated in the opening onto the second level porch.

The windows have six over nine or six over six lites. The facade windows are framed by louvered shutters.

The interior retains the original grained paneled wainscoating and doors, and Federalstyle mantels. The walls are horizontal ramdom width painted boards.

A narrow stair to the left of the entrance is contained in the wall which divides the two downstairs rooms of the front section.

The stair in the rear sectionerise from the front right corner of this earlier portion of the structure.

The detached kitchen is a reproduction of the original one that was located further from the house. A smokehouse in the backyard is yet to be restored.

#### Statement of Significance (in one paragraph)

Marshall's Grove is significant as a good example of the early plantation houses of Dallas County. Its Federal period styling, its basically unaltered design, and its occupancy by descendants of the original owner make it an important Dallas County landmark.

Much of the original furniture is still in use. Dr. Marshall, a native of Charleston, S.C., was a planter as well as a physician. Marshall had migrated to Alabama by 1830. His plantation near the Beech Creek swamp was thought to be unhealthy so his home was built on a 150 acre tract on high ground.

Several years ago the great-granddaughter of Dr. Marshall returned to restore the dwelling which had been vacant for a number of years. Because of the period of vacancy few changes has been made. Mrs. Llewellyn is painstaking in her research and the visitor has a great sense of zeitgeist within both house and grounds.

During the Battle of Selma (1865), Federal General James Harrison Wilson commandered the house. Mrs. Marshall and four daughters were allowed to stay in the front downstairs bedroom, where meals were served to them. The letters she later received from Federal officers who stayed in the house have been preserved. Once again family tradition holds to the "Masonic legend" in preventing destruction by the Federal armies. Dr. Marshall's Masonic credentials were displayed in a chart hanging on the wall and thus said to have influenced fellow Masons in the Union forces in the decision not to destroy the house.
