The Michael Cresap House is located on the north side of Main Street and the junction of Green Spring Road, Oldtown, Maryland. It is just north of the Chesapeake and Ohio Canal and the Potomac River and south of the Western Maryland Railroad track and Maryland Route 53.

The two-story fieldstone structure has a basement and an attic. The north elevation was built against an almost perpendicular slope in order to allow the original stream to flow through the basement. As a result of its position the north wall of the basement is underground and the first floor is at the hillside ground level on the north side. The south side first floor is the entrance into the basement. The building is three bays wide with a central door on the first and second stories of the north facade.

On the street (south) facade the basement may be entered from the yard level, while its back wall is underground, where the spring flows. A porch runs across the south facade of the first story, its floor gives shelter to the area over the basement doorway.

The west gable-end wall is blank. The short interior chimney juts out of the tin roof not quite flush with the west gable end wall.

Adjoining the house to the east is a two-story brick addition which is of 19th. century type materials.

There are iron bars on the basement windows on the south facade which date from the period when the basement was used as a jail. Some digging about this time in the interior of the west wall in the basement, into the foundations of the chimney stack revealed earlier masonry forms indicating an earlier fireplace and chimney.

On the upper floors, the present wood trim is of the late 18th. century or early 19th. century type, indicating that the principal rooms were remodeled. There is no interior doorway between the old house and the newer brick addition.

In 1970 a "passage" was discovered which contained 18th. century coins, sections of pipes and other artifacts.

There are two interior rooms on each floor of the main building. Finished in plain style, they have wide board floors.

The Michael Cresap house is owned by the Reverand Irving Allen, who purchased it in order to preserve the structure. He has installed a museum of period artifacts and maintains the

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

The Michael Cresap House was the home of the eighteenth century frontiersman, Michael Cresap, (1742-1775). It is reputably the oldest extant building in Oldtown whose village history dates to the seventeenth century. A Shawnee tribe had an Indian village there.

In 1741 Michael Cresap's father Thomas Cresap (c.1702-1790) a prominent frontiersman, founded Oldtown and built a fortified trading post and home. Until the establishment of Cumberland, Maryland, Oldtown was the only settlement in Maryland west of the Cononocheague Creek in Washington County.

Michael Cresap followed his father's example by building the extant structure as a trading post-home and by exploring the wilderness in search of sites for future settlement. Cresap was one of the outstanding eighteenth century frontiersmen in the Ohio Valley although he is not as well known today as his contemporaries; Daniel Boone and George Rogers Clark. In 1774 Cresap led an expedition to clear bottom lands of the Muskingum River for occupation. Strained relations with the Indians compounded the difficulties of Cresap's frontier party. On at least two occasions he prevented his men from attacking. The murder of a peaceful Indian family, far distant from Cresap and his party, touched off Lord Dunmore's War (April-October 1774). Cresap served in the war as a captain in the Virginia militia; he was a signatory of the peace treaty.

His stature as a leader is attested to by the fact that western Maryland volunteers at the beginning of the Revolution chose Michael Cresap to command them. In 1775 Cresap led these men to join the Continental Army at Boston, Massachusettes, JAN 10 covering the 550 mile journey in twenty-two days--a remarkable twenty-five miles per day. Once in New England Cresap suffered NATIO a relapse of an earlier illness which forced him to resign his REGIS command. He died in New York City on October 18, 1775, en-

Cresap's home in Oldtown became the property of his widow.

After remarrying she conveyed it to Michael Cresap's son-in-law,

#7. DESCRIPTION

building which attracts visitors from all over the nation.

#8. SIGNIFICANCE

Luther Martin (c. 1742-1826), first attorney general of the State of Maryland, and an eminent lawyer. Martin held the property for a short time; he sold it to his brother-in-law, James Cresap.

Luther Martin's association with Michael Cresap gained national notoriety in the 1790's. Thomas Jefferson in Notes on the State of Virginia published an account of the murder of the Indian family that touched off Lord Dunmore's War naming Cresap as the culprit. Through several letters published in newspapers Martin refuted Jefferson's story. The evidence completely exonerated Cresap although Jefferson never conceded.

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
