**Description:** The Gen. Felix K. Zollicoffer Monument is a simple obelisk approximately eight feet tall and three feet wide at the base. It is made of rough hewn limestone with a base that flares out slightly beyond the width of the shaft. The face of the monument is smooth and has an inscription relating to the death of Gen. Zollicoffer, several of his officers and to the nobility of southern manhood. It also contains the names of the people responsible for erecting the monument.

Statement of Signioficance: The Gen. Felix K. Zollicoffer Monument meets National Register Criterion A and is significant within the context of "Civil War Monuments in Kentucky, 1861-1935." This monument was erected by Bennett Young. He was one of the state leaders of the United Confederate Veterans (UCV). The UCV was very active in Kentucky and was responsible for several monuments that were constructed within the Commonwealth. This monument was erected after Young was alerted to the work of a young woman, Dorotha Burton, in Nancy, Kentucky who decorated a large white oak tree near the site of the monument each Memorial Day to honor Gen. Zollicoffer and the fallen Confederates whom she felt were being neglected. The inscription on the monument pays homage to Zollicoffer and others, but it also praises the efforts of the Confederate Army and the men who "... died with Gen. Zollicoffer for right as they saw it." This monument was erected as a stirring tribute to the dead, not merely a memorial.

Verbal Boundary Description - The monument whose boundaries form a circle with a radius of ten feet centered on the monument located in Zollicoffer Park. This monument was previously listed as a noncontributing object in both the National Register and National Historic Landmark nominations for the Battle of Mill Springs Historic Areas.

Verbal Boundary Justification - The area associated with the monument is restricted to the ground on which the monument sits and a small buffer around it. The setting outside such a restricted area is not seen as critically important to maintaining an integrity of association. Because the focus of the multiple property submissions is the significance of the monuments, their proposed area of listing will reflect that they have been considered by-and-large, in isolation from their surrounds.
