HISTORICAL BACKGROUND

Harold Hornburg was the son of William C. Hornburg, founder of Hornburg Ford, and automobile agency.

HISTORICAL SIGNIFICANCE

Although Harold Hornburg was a long time Hartland businessman, that fact alone does not make him significant enough to warrant the building's nomination based on criterion B. No other information is available at this time to justify a historical significance nomination under criterion A.

DESCRIPTION

ARCHITECTURAL/ENGINEERING SIGNIFICANCE

The Harold Hornburg House is situated at 213 Warren Street in the Village of Hartland. Built in 1928 by Hartland contractor William Brockmeyer from plans provided by Eschweiler & Eschweiler, the one and one half story lannon stone veneered Tudor Revival residence is set on a concrete foundation and has a multi-gabled roof with clipped gables. The roofing materials are "Weather Best Thatched Stained Shingles" meant to resemble English thatch roofs. The roofing materials and the groundhugging profile they produce are the essential features of the romantic nature of the design. On the main facade the house features a gabled round-arched entrance porch, a trio of windows with leaded glass, and an iron balconet. Attached to the east facade is a stone wishing well with a similar "thatch" roof. The house has a lannon stone fireplace, a wooden staircase with a wrought iron balustrade. and coved ceilings.

The Harold Hornburg House has architectural significance as the finest example of the Tudor Revival Style in Hartland, a style prevalent in the Village during the early 20th century. The cottage inspired detail such as the well, thatched roof, multi-gabled roofline and stone cladding are striking. The house retains outstanding integrity.

The Cotswald cottage variant of the Tudor Revival is uncommon in the area. In an interview with the architectural historian Mr. Hornburg revealed that he transported the contractor Brockmeyer to Oshkosh to show him a "thatch" roof which he wanted duplicated. Mrs Hornburg and Mr Brockmeyer compiled the roof design and material choices from the Oshkosh site and various published plans.
