DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

Sherman Tavern is located off Kentucky Highway 25, the old road connecting Williamstown with Cincinnati, in rural Grant County. The house sits on a slight rise, well back from the road almost hidden from view by the numerous trees and shrubs dotting the property.

The story-and-a-half tavern is based on a T-plan, of frame construction, possibly log underneath. The facade, seven bays in width, is distinguished by a recessed porch supported by four chamfered posts, and a gabled roof. The Greek Revival entrance contains an eight-pane transom and four-pane sidelights, with double doors having four horizontal panels in the upper section over two vertical panels.

The north and south ends are identical, having a brick chimney flush with the wall with two small windows at the second level.

The ell extends from the central section of the house with a recessed gallery on the north side supported by chamfered posts. Also on the gallery side are two dormers near the north end of the ell, allowing natural light into the second story.

The floor plan of the front block is simply laid out, with two rooms at either end of equal size, and a large center room. The woodwork appears to be late Federal, unadorned and almost totally intact—including mantels, and chair—rail. The front rooms have doors opening into the center room as well as the porch. There are four rooms in the ell, all with doors opening onto the side porch. Within 10 feet of the side of the tavern is a well house. It has been said that there were once ten slave cabins on the property. None, however, are extant.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

Sherman Tavern, located near the vicinity of Sherman in northeastern Kentucky, remains as a good example of the popular version of a three-part Greek Revival composition featuring a recessed pedimented porch. The structure has historical interest in being one of the mid-19th century taverns on the Lexington-Covington Road, one of the first macadamized roads in Kentucky.

The one-and-one-half story frame building was constructed by Lewis Myers, an early settler of Grant County, between $1820-1840.^1$ Myers operated a tavern on the only direct route from Lexington north to Covington. Ample pens and water were available for stock, and there were several cabins for slaves.

In 1850 the tavern was purchased by Lewis Cason.² Cason and his descendants continued to operate the tavern until 1900.³ The tavern prospered until the rail-road came through a few years after the Civil War. Chap Cason continued to operate the tavern until the turn of the century. After 1900 the frame structure served as a dwelling place on the Cason farm, who retained ownership until 1970.

Sherman Tavern is one of two documented inns remaining today in Grant County. Both taverns were situated on the old Lexington to Covington Road, the transportation route connecting the Bluegrass to Northern Kentucky and Cincinnati until the completion of the railroad in the 1870's.

The nominated acreage includes the tavern and three outbuildings. The barn, situated to the southwest of the main house (see U.S.G.S. map, between points C and D), is the oldest of the three outbuildings, and was constructed at the same time as the tavern. It was directly associated with the tavern, being used as a stock barn by the drovers who stopped there enroute to Cincinnati. It is in a deteriorated condition, and serves no function today. Located directly north in close proximity is another barn, built about 1939, which was part of the Cason farm after the close of the tavern. Approximately 150 feet to the north is the third outbuilding, another barn, which was constructed fifty years ago. This barn was also a part of the Cason farm after the tavern closed.

Beginning at point A on the west side of U. S. Highway 25 proceeding 725 ft. west to point B; thence 330 ft. south to point C; thence 760 ft. east to point D; thence 340 ft. north along the west side of U. S. Highway 25 to point A.
