Built in the 1740's, Hopsewee is a two-and-one-half story frame structure on a brick foundation covered by scored tabby, with a hipped roof, dormers, and two interior chimneys. A broad two-story porch or piazza with square columns extends across the front of the house. The farmhouse, five-bays wide and three-bays deep, has a central hall plan. The center hall extends through the house from front to rear and divides the four rooms on each of the first two floors into pairs. Each of these eight rooms has its individual fireplace. The mantels, wainscoting, cornice mold, and heart pine floors are all original and of wainscoting, cornice mold, and heart pine floors are all original excellent craftsmanship. The full cellar is brick and divided into rooms. Excellent craftsmanship. The full cellar is located to the northeast excellent craftsmanship, were probably originally used as kitchens. The two one-story cypress shingled out-buildings located to the northeast and northwest of the main house, were probably originally used as kitchens. TATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

"Hopsewee" was the birthplace and boyhood home of Thomas Lynch, Jr., a Signer of the Declaration of Independence for South Carolina, planter, soldier, and politician, from 1749 to 1763. It is the only extant house closely related with Thomas Lynch, Jr.

### Brief Sketch of the Life of Thomas Lynch, Jr., 1749-1779

Thomas Lynch, Jr., was born in Prince Georges Parish, Winyaw (now Georgetown County), South Carolina, on August 5, 1749, the only son of a wealthy rice planter. He attended the Indigo Society School in Georgetown, South Carolina; from 1764 to 1772 he was at Eton, Cambridge, in England, and then studying law at the Middle Temple, London. He returned to South Carolina in 1772 and having acquired a distaste for law, his father permitted him to abandon this profession and become a planter. Toward this end his father presented him with the Peach Tree Plantation in St. James Parish on the North Santee, Charleston County, South Carolina. In May 1772 Thomas Lynch, Jr., married Elizabeth Shubrick.

Thomas Lynch, Jr., entered public life in 1774. He was a member of the first and second provincial congress (1774-1776), of the constitutional committee for South Carolina (1776), and of the first state General Assembly (1776). In June 1775 he was appointed a captain in the First South Carolina Regiment and in July he went into North Carolina to recruit his company. On this trip he contracted bilious fever which made him a partial invalid for the remainder of his life.

On March 23, 1776, the South Carolina General Assembly appointed Thomas Lynch, Jr., as sixth delegate to the Second Continental Congress, so that he might care for his father, also a delegate, who had suffered a stroke and was in very poor health. The son's health was too feeble to permit continued activity in public life, but Thomas Lynch, Jr., was present and voted when the Declaration of Independence was adopted and shortly afterward signed the document. He did not remain long in Congress however, for his health began to decline with alarming rapidity. Father and son began the journey homeward by easy stages, but his father, Thomas Lynch, Sr., died at Annapolis, Maryland, in December 1776 and was buried in St. Ann's churchyard. The son reached South Carolina but failed

### History of the House

Built by Thomas Lynch, Sr., in the 1740's, Thomas Lynch, Jr., was born in the plantation house on August 5, 1749. His father sold the farmhouse about 1763, when his son was 13 years old. "Hopsewee" had fallen into decay and the garden was much overgrown with weeds and bushes when the present owner purchased the property around 1948.
