The newspaper article cited in Item 7 also said:

Men who are familiar with public buildings and who have examined the new work of art and convenience that is so creditable to Cordova and Alaska, declare that it is the best and finest Post Office Building erected north of Bellingham, Wash, and in fact there is no better in the U.S. for a town the size of Cordova.

Although the Cordova Post Office and Courthouse is not architecturally dramatic, and no significant historical events are known to be associated with it, it does have the distinctive air of an early 20th Century government institutional building and is therefore recommended for listing in the National Register as a structure of local significance. It is reported to be the oldest Post Office building in Alaska still in use.

The configuration and appearance today is little different from its appearance at the time of its completion in July 1924. The building is L-shaped, measuring 49 feet across the front and 84 feet deep. It is set into a hillside rock formation that was only partially excavated, so that the basement floor is the full width, but only part of the depth, of the upper two floors. The roof is in the form of a low hip, with a squared brick chimney rising from the center of the triangle formed by the rear triangle and another similar chimney rising from the angled crease at the bend of the L.

Due to the configuration of the building as it is set into the hillside, the front, as it faces the street, is three stories high. At the left is a double leaf outward-opening pair of entry doors, with an overhead panel light. Originally this was crested by an unadorned entablature. Recently this was replaced by a permanent type canopy covering the outside space above the entranceway. To the right are four window sashes, spaced out at 1/6th across the building width, of 1/4 scale to the main central windows on the upper two levels of the building face.

On the second tier (the main floor) the left hand window, above the entranceway, consists of a double hung 12-light sash, while the center three windows in line consist of double hung 24-light sashes. Carrying out both scale and classical balance, the right hand window of the second tier consists of a double hung sash with 18 lights. The third row of windows, for the second upper main floor, contains three center windows matching the three center windows of the second row and end windows matching the right hand window of the second row.

The left and right sides of the building are well lighted by series of double hung windows which reflect the functions of each interior space. On the left side of the building the basement floor has only one opening, a door, since the rear of the lot was not excavated. On the right side of the building the tip of the L has two windows and a service door, but the main service door is at the far end of the right wall. Originally that was a double leaf panel and glass door with a hinged transom light set in an unadorned doorway. Some years later a permanent canopy was built outward to protect unloading mail trucks from rain and snow, and that loading dock area was permanently enclosed in 1974 or 1975.

Entering the building through the front doorway, onto the ground floor, one comes upon a wide stairway, which leads to the main floor, which has been occupied by the Cordova Post Office since 1924. In the basement (ground) floor are service spaces, including the furnace room, a fuel storage area, and a supply room. The heating plant was renewed and the radiators throughout the building replaced by convectors in 1974.

The entire main floor above the ground floor is occupied by the Post Office. While no structural changes have been made, the postal facility has been upgraded from time to time. The second (or upper) floor is occupied by the state court, and provides space for a courtroom and judges' chambers. Originally part of this floor was used to house prisoners. That segment of the upper floor was altered some years back, including removal of the external window bars, and the space is now utilized by the Cordova Office of the U.S. Forest Service. The top floor was described in 1924, as follows:

The third floor was a court room 26 x 26, divided by a rail and supplied with an elevation for the judge. Adjoining is a library or consultation room with a private office for the judge. Across the corridor are offices for the district attorney and the clerk of the court. In the rear on this floor are the jail rooms for men and women, supplied with toilets and bath and hot and cold running water. The men's department is also supplied with a cell. The marshal's office and jail kitchen are at the extreme rear and entered from the alley as well as from the main corridor.

The outer skin of the building appears to have been made up of layer upon layer of concrete poured into wooden forms in place. This was a technique then being used experimentally, and a few years later refined for high rise buildings by the addition of steel-rod reinforcements and the development of moveable forms. This technique is still in widespread use for construction of high-rise commercial and apartment buildings, combined with concrete slab flooring and cantilevered balconies. More recent buildings produced by this methodology are usually finished by a non load bearing skin or veneer of recent technological origin, such as steel or aluminum sheets in polychrome or geometric designs. Some buildings of this origin have proven equally attractive with the concrete left bare to weather. One example is the Cadman Plaza North Development in Brooklyn Heights, New York, built in 1967.

This building was constructed to conform to the needs of its community, of a scale which provided needed space and utility, and of design and materials which were then experimental, have proven durable during the past 53 years, and appear to have many more years of useful life remaining.
