St. Anne's Church on Indian Island is a simple vernacular structure built in 1828-30 and altered at subsequent periods. Originally, the church was a one and a half story gable roofed structure with one of its gable ends used as a facade. The facade had a first story central doorway with a window on either side. Under the peak of the gable was a Federal style fanlight. On the peak of the roof near the front of the gable stood a square tower with a belfrey. The left and right side walls each had a series of three windows.

In the late nineteenth or early twentieth century, St. Anne's Church was somewhat altered. The tower and belfrey were removed from the roof, and a tall square tower and belfrey were erected on the front of the building, thus eliminating the original facade entrance and windows. The fanlight was probably taken from the gable peak and installed on the front of the new tower just above the entrance. Above the fanlight was placed a rectangular window. On either side of the tower were three rectangular windows, one above another. The final stages of the tower was a belfrey with a Palladian window on each side and a square pinnacle at each corner. From the center rose a four sided spire, a larger version of the pinnacle caps. Atop both caps and the spire were placed crosses. During the turn of the century alteration, the series of three pointed arch stained glass windows were installed on each of the two side walls. Most of these features remain on the building.

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In recent years the exterior of St. Anne's has been covered with aluminum siding. This has resulted in the elimination of three tower windows as well as the Palladian windows in the belfrey. Despite changes with time, this chapel remains an important landmark which has endured for almost one hundred and fifty years.

The history of St. Anne's begins in 1688 with the establishment of this mission to the Penobscot Indians. Sometime between this date and 1700, a church was erected on the site of the present church. Local legend says that an architect came from France to build the first church, but this has no documentation. The mission was established by Father Louis Pierre Thury who was ordained in Quebec in 1667 and who died on June 3, 1699 at Chibouctou in present day New Brunswick.

In 1705, the mission to the Penobscot tribe was transferred to the Jesuits and was served by Father Antoine Gaulen from 1705 to 1782. From 1732 to 1792, there was no priest at Indian Island except for the occassional missionary who stopped to say Mass on route from Quebec to Nova Scotia or New Brunswick.

From 1792 to 1818, the following missionaries ministered to the Penobscots; Francis R. Ciquard from 1792 to 1794, John Cheverus from 1794 to 1798, and James R. Romagne from 1799 to 1818. These missionaries ministered to the Indians during the summer months and spent the winters with the Kavanaughs at Damariscotta Mills. This was the earliest Irish Catholic settlement in Maine. It was during the visits of John Cheverus that the second church was built on Indian Island occupying the same site as the first.

During the late 1820's and early 1830's Father Virgil Barber was the resident priest at Indian Island. It was during his pastorate that the third and present church was built on the Island occupying the site of the first two St. Anne's. The church was constructed between the years 1828 and 1830 with funds granted by the Maine State Legislature.

This church built between 1828 and 1830 is the subject of this nomination. The church has been altered somewhat in the location of the spire as outlined in the description. In 1848, when Father John Bapst arrived at Indian Island, the church was "a rather good looking building with a steeple and bell and a choir gallery."

Father Bapst only ministered to the Indians for a few years until he went to minister to the Catholics in Bangor and Ellsworth. From

8. SIGNIFICANCE

ca. 1855 to 1926, St. Anne's was ministered to by the resident priests at the parishes in Old Town. In 1926, St. Anne's became a parish with its own full time priest.

St. Anne's Church on Indian Island is quite historically significant for around this church revolves the whole history of the French missions to Maine Indians. St. Anne's is also one of the oldest Catholic churches in New England, being established in 1688. The building itself is also one of the oldest Catholic churches still standing in New England having been built between 1828 and 1830.

Also at Indian Island is the oldest Catholic burying ground in New England, established in 1688. It is quite near the church.
