Describe the present and original (if known) physical appearance

The Hall-Crull House is a two story frame structure located in a rural area near Rushville, Indiana. The original section of the home was constructed in 1855 and featured an octagonal plan. A later addition to the house, located towards the rear of the structure, was constructed in 1865 along more conventional lines. Although currently covered with aluminum siding, the building's most important features, its octagonal style and its porch, remain plainly visible.

The main (south) facade of the house is given over completely to the recessed two-story porch. Both levels of this porch feature octagonal porch columns and balustrades with flat, paddle-like balusters. All of the other original facades not obscured by the 1865 addition contain a single pair of rectangular double-hung windows on each floor level. Historic photographs show that the building originally featured a plain frieze and modest scroll-cut cornice brackets, but these elements were lost when the siding was applied.

The four main rooms are located on each floor of the original octagonal section of the house. The living room, dining room, and first floor bedroom still feature fireplaces, as do two of the second-floor bedrooms. The 1865 addition contains the kitchen, bathroom, washroom, and a back porch. The home is situated on a heavily-wooded lot approximately 1/2 acre in area. A garage and barn are also located on this lot but both are relatively modern structures and are not included in this nomination.

Statement of Significance (in one paragraph)

The Hall-Crull House is architecturally important as a rare example of the octagonal style of domestic architecture which found favor for a brief period during the mid-19th century. The octagon style was popularized by Orton Squire Fowler's book, A House for All, or the Gravel Walland Octagonal Mode of Building, published in 1848, but the style was short-lived and had largely died out by 1860. The Hall-Crull House is one of less than a dozen of this type known to be extant in Indiana.

Beyond the rarity of its octagonal style, the Hall-Crull House is unusual because of its recessed porches. In his book, Fowler advocated large porches, preferably encircling the octagonal house. While most Indiana octagons were more restrained in this regard, it was normally the practice to build the porches as projecting elements. The unique recessed porches of the Hall-Crull House, while not in keeping with Fowler's suggestions, help make the unusual shape of the structure more apparent.

The Hall-Crull House was built around 1855 by William S. Hall, a cabinetmaker who was also involved in local politics. Although born in Rush County, Hall spent much of his youth in Cincinnati, working as an apprentice with his uncle, Joseph Hall. He returned to Rush County late in 1836 and established himself in business. In February, 1839, he was elected Justice of the Peace for Washington Township, serving in that capacity until 1847. In 1853 he was elected Trustee of Washington Township, and continued to hold this office until 1878, except for a short period during the mid-1860's when he served as a member of the State Legislature. As Trustee, he was instrumental in the development of the local school system, and caused the construction of many new school buildings.

In 1928, this structure became the residence of the Walter Crull family. Although in recent years the home has been used as a rental property, it is still owned by a descendant of Walter Crull.
