	This house, while having been altered through the years, still retains a sufficient amount of its original fabric that it should be recognized and retained. We are therefore including it for its architectural significance, for its association with the exploration and settlement of the Bergen County area, and for its remaining historic fabric. As such, it is included in the Thematic Nomination to the National Register of Historic Places for the Early Stone Houses of Bergen County, New Jersey.

Apparently, this house was erected in 1784 for John A. Van Voorhees at the time of his marriage, and on the homestead farm of his father, Albert W. Van Voorhis, whose house stands westward (NJ-161). The actual transfer of the lot from father to son does not appear in the County records.

Mention of the house of this John A. Van Voorhis is apparently made in a deed of 27 September, 1805, conveying to the Reformed Dutch Church a half acre lot "At a place commonly called Wicough and on the East side of the main road leading from the Dwelling House of John Van Voorhis to the Swelling House of John Eccorson", in Franklin Township. (Bergen Deed Bk. W-50). Likewise, in a deed of 16 June, 1838, John Van Voorhis Jr. and wife Sally of Franklin Twp. to the Elders of the Dutch Church of Wyckoff, in which a quarter acre addition to the church lot is conveyed, is mentioned the "East side of the public road leading from the house of the said John Van Voorhis, Jr. to the house of Cornelius Ackerman." The road mentioned is obviously the present Main Street in the village. (Deed Bk. Z3-454). The church has been surveyed as NJ-338.

John Van Voorhis, Jr., to whom was devised the paternal homestead in 1831 as recited above, evidently was residing thereon in 1838. He acquired from his brothers, James and William, by deed of May 6, 1834, the fifty acre tract on both sides of Main Street, south of the church, which they received in the will of their father. (Deed Bk. M3251).

But by deed of August 25, 1840, this John Van Voorhis, Jr. and wife Sally, of Franklin Township, Bergen County, conveyed the homestead farm in four tracts to Corines Quackenbush of same township for \$6,000. Corines Quackenbush willed the homestead farm to his son John C. in 1889, who in turn willed it to his son Abram in 1895. Abram Quackenbush willed it to his daughter in 1908 and she sold it to Hugh J. Edwards in 1920. It was sold to the M. M. Freeman & Co., Inc. in 1933 by Jay Frank Parmly and was used as a "road house" tavern.
