Describe present and historic physical appearance.

The James E. Slaton House is a two-story frame, five bay, central passage plan I-House with a one-story ell completed in 1864. The house is sited on a hill overlooking small tributaries of the Pond River in a rural section of the county. Within a half-mile of the house are large strip mining areas but the integrity of the property's site and setting remains intact.

On the main (west) facade is a two-story porch added in 1895 which extends across three of the five bays. This porch has square columns with Doric influenced capitals and square balusters on the porch's railing. The main entrance has ca. 1900 glass and frame door with four-pane sidelights and a four-light transom. Also in the central bay, a similar doorway leads to the second tier of the porch. The house has weatherboard siding and windows are original six-over-six sash. The house has a gable roof of composition shingles and two brick exterior end chimneys. The rear one-story wing is original but has several added one-over-one ca.1900 windows, an added chimney and the original porch on the east facade of the ell has been enclosed.

The interior is unaltered with original Greek Revival influenced mantles, a staircase with a chamfered newel post and square balusters, and four panel doors. At the rear of the house are three outbuildings constructed in the early and mid-20th century. These outbuildings are not associated with the property's period of significance and are included as non-contributing.

State significance of property, and justify criteria, criteria considerations, and areas and periods of significance noted above.

The James E. Slaton House is a distinctive example of a two-story central passage plan I-House from the mid-19th century. It is one of only two two-story central passage plan I-House residences identified in the rural areas of the county as constructed prior to 1870. The house received a new porch in 1895 but this has been the only major change to the residence. The interior retains its original floor plan and detailing.

The house was built by James E. Slaton between 1860-64 on land that he purchased in 1850 and 1860. The house was completed in a central passage plan design typical of the period and the influence of the Greek Revival style can be found in details such as the roof pitch, proportion, windows, doors and interior detailing. Slaton was a prominent farmer in the community and had five children. The house was later altered by his descendants in 1895 but few other changes have occurred to the residence. The house remains in the possession of the Slaton family which continues to farm the surrounding land.






Verbal Boundary Description: The location for the James E. Slaton House is illustrated on accompanying Hopkins County tax map 122, lot 6 which is drawn at a scale of 1" = 400' and the accompanying sketch map. The boundary follows a rectangle lot measuring 150' by 150' which contains the house and three non-contributing outbuildings. The boundary is defined by a driveway on the south and fence lines on the west, north and east.


<u>Verbal Boundary Justification</u>: The boundary for the James E. Slaton House is drawn to include the house and adjacent yard which has historically associated with the house and immediate outbuildings. The boundary excludes 20th century barns and outbuildings to the east of the property.
