DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

The Kent's Hill School Historic District is comprised of five architecturally or historically significant buildings. Dating from 1858 to 1932, these buildings have undergone little change. The Kent's Hill School is located on the top of Kent's Hill, on the south side of State Route 17 in Readfield.

Buildings contributing to the character of the district:

- 1. Newton Gymnasium: 1932, Colonial Revival, 1½ stories, brick, Doric portico, cross-gabled hip roof.
- 2. Blethen Hall (Headmaster's House): 1883-84, Queen Anne, 2½ stories, frame, clapboarded and shingled, facade porch, cross-gabled hip roof.
- 3. Bearce Hall (including Deering Chapel): 1873, Italianate with Mansard roof, $3\frac{1}{2}$ stories, brick, 4-story facade tower with polygonal belfry.
- 4. Ricker Hall: 1893-94, Colonial Revival, 3½ stories, frame, clapboarded, hip roof.
- 5. Sampson Hall: 1858-60, Italianate, 4 stories, brick, pedimented pavillion, flat roof.

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STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

Before the advent of publicly supported secondary schools in Maine, this level of education was largely carried on by private academies on one hand, or seminaries, so-called, affiliated with some Protestant denomination on the other. Academies were far more common and were scattered widely so that almost every community of any size boasted one. Seminaries, however, existed in a very small number and one of the earliest of these was what has now evolved as Kent's Hill School, a private, non-denominational, preparatory school.

Luther Sampson, the founder, was a Revolutionary soldier originally from Duxbury, Massachusetts, who, taking advantage of a veteran's land grant, moved in 1799 to Readfield where he opened up a 215 acre farm. Evidently inspired by the itinerant Methodist evangelist, Rev. Jesse Lee, who preached for a time in the region, this industrious, but largely unlettered farmer formed, in 1821, the Readfield Religious and Charitable Society which was duly incorporated. The purpose of the organization being to provide Christian education for young people, Sampson donated 140 acres of land for a school site together with a new house, barns, sheds, cattle and sheep as well as equipment, all to the value of over \$10,000.

The school, soon named Maine Wesleyan Seminary, began operation in 1824, at first admitting boys only but shortly after becoming coeducational. An unusual feature of the institution was that a large and productive farm with orchards was maintained and many disadvantaged students in the early years were able to work off their tuition through labor in the fields or barns. A fine orchard is still maintained by the school.

Of the present buildings, the most noteworthy is Bearce Hall, a singularly well proportioned and imposing $3\frac{1}{2}$ story Mansard brick structure with a central pavillion and handsome bell tower, constructed in 1873. This was designed by Francis H. Fassett of Portland, Maine's leading mid-nineteenth century architect.

Fassett, who was as much responsible as anyone for the rebuilding not only of Portland, but also Bath and Augusta after disastrous fires, was the designer of such structures as Corthell Hall on the Gorham Campus, the Portland Public Library, and the Fifth Maine Regiment Building, all presently listed on the National Register of Historic Places.

Wood framed Ricker Hall, an early Colonial Revival design, was also executed by Fassett in 1893 and, while not as ambitious a structure as Bearce, combines with it to leave the mark of this noted architect clearly stamped on the Kent's Hill scene.
