The three bay, $2\frac{1}{2}$ story gambrel section has a side hall with an open stair. The stair has a turned newel with simple tapered and turned balasters; this is mahogany. There is a front and rear parlor off the hall, each with an end wall fireplace. Off the other side of the hall is a two story 3 bay gable wing with the kitchen, dining room, pantry, and other rooms.

The door casings have symetrical mouldings with corner blocks having carved leaf designs. The dining room mantel has a pair of engaged colonettes supporting the mantel shelf.

The front entrance has elaborate side lights and woodwork. The side lights and transom have oval wood tracery with lead ornaments on the face of the glass. The entrance framing is set off with pilasters and colonettes with an entablature and transom above. There are ornate entablatures the first floor windows on the front.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

The first Randolph was Benjamin F. originally Fitz-Randolph, who was born in England and who emigrated to America in 1684. His son Moleson was the progenitor of the Randolph Family in Middlesex County. The builder of the house, Ephraim, was the son of Ruene Randolph who was a son of Moleson Randolph. Ruene had married Miss Elizabeth Randolph in 1770. Ephraim was the second son born in 1786. In 1813 Reune conveyed a tract of land (49 acres) to Ephraim which is described as "part of the plantation where Inow live". The graves of Ruene and Elizabeth Fitz Randolph are located in the family cementary on the grounds of the Piscataway High School, which ajoins the tract of land in question. Although the blue prints bear the name of Ephraim Randolph as the original builder, local tradition claims that Moleson Randolph was the actual builder.

On certain occasions this house and its grounds are open to the public for their enjoyment of the lovely grounds and house.
