Description

The Raton Convention-Recreation Center, built as the Raton Armory, is a one story, rectilinear building with a basement. It has a reinforced concrete frame, concrete walls with large window bays, and a barrel vault roof with rolled asphalt shingles. A foyer with a stepped, flat roof and three recessed entries fronts the auditorium/gymnasium portion of the building at the north side. Extending south of the auditorium is an office wing with a stepped flat roof topped by a parapet with a concrete coping. The main entry to this wing is also recessed. The property faces on S. 3rd St. and is flanked by the city's athletic complex with the high school football stadium to the south and baseball fields to the north. A residential block faces the building on the west. When the city converted the armory to a convention center in the late 1980s, renovation included replacing the building's mechanical systems and some windows, dropping the auditorium ceiling when a central cooling and heating system were added, and adding partitions to reshape some interior spaces. All of these changes were planned to preserve the historic character of the building, so that it continues to convey the appearance and feeling of a New Deal armory project.

Situated on a slope with its basement excavated to permit entry along its exposed east side, the auditorium/gymnasium portion of the building appears monolithic when viewed from the northeast. The barrel-vaulted roof curves above the building's poured concrete walls, and five large concrete piers dividing the window bays punctuate the parapet. A chimney marks the mechanical room rising above the roof midway on the building's south side. The walls, now painted gray, appear scored, bearing the imprints of the retaining boards used during the pouring of the concrete, and a molded concrete string course appears just below the parapet.

The entry to the gymnasium/auditorium is located in a stepped foyer marked by a brick coping. Each of the three double glass doors is located in a deep recess with chamfered corners. The windows in the gym, originally large hopper windows, have been replaced with glass blocks similar to those at the recessed

entry along the office wing. As the ground slopes to the east, the window bays between the piers extend to the basement revealing addition glass block windows. The earlier hopper windows on the rear side of the office have been replaced with large fixed windows.

The office wing to the south, constituting the leg of the building's informal "T" plan, is entered through double glass doors set in a recessed entry. A concrete porch extends out from the entry which is flanked by block glass windows. A concrete block room with small fixed windows at the southern end of the building is also a part of the original building. Previously containing offices and meeting rooms as well as the quarters of a resident guardsman, the interior of the office wing has been refurbished to include an atrium/stairwell and administrative offices and meeting rooms. Retaining its original footprint and renovated in a way sympathetic with its original appearance, the building is in excellent condition.

Statement of Significance

The Raton Convention-Recreation Center, previously the Raton Armory, was a WPA project funded in 1940 and completed in 1941. Constructed during the final years of the WPA as the federal government shifted an increasing percentage of its public works programs toward preparing for World War II, the project provided jobs that helped to stimulate Raton's economy and to equip the New Mexico National Guard with modern facilities. The building is eligible under Criterion A for its close connection with military and social history in Raton. It is also eligible under Criterion C as a good example of the plans, methods of construction, materials and workmanship New Deal projects employed in carrying out hundreds of construction projects in New Mexico.

Throughout the United States, the WPA undertook over 900 armory-related projects ranging from refurbishing older armories

to constructing shooting ranges, stables, and new armories. A few such projects were undertaken in towns throughout New Mexico, especially after 1938 as it became apparent that the United States was being drawn into the turmoil of world events. In November, 1940, a \$121,000 appropriation was made by the WPA for the construction of a modern armory in Raton. As with other armories, the intent of the building was multiple. To meet the needs of the artillery battalion that was posted there, the building included vaults for arms, a shooting range, a kitchen and mess hall, and quarters for a member of the guard who provided security. At the same time the building was also intended to serve as a community and recreation center for Raton and included a gymnasium/auditorium and meeting rooms.

The project provided work relief jobs during a period in which construction on Raton's several New Deal school projects had come to an end. The building's simplicity and efficiency of design were consistent with the labor-intensive character of most WPA projects. The poured concrete walls requiring the construction of numerous wood frames and the barrel-vaulted roof typical of several WPA gymnasium/auditorium projects throughout the state illustrate the labor-intensive workmanship and use of materials characteristic of even a large scale WPA project such as the Raton Armory.

No longer needing the armory, the New Mexico National Guard granted the property to the Raton Board of Education in 1973. After using the building as a recreational and meeting center through the late 1980s, the board then transferred it to the City of Raton which renovated it for use as the city's convention center. Citizens of the community are proud of the city's efforts to save the building and of its efforts to renovate it in a way sympathetic with its historic role in Raton.

Verbal Boundary Description

A parcel described in Colfax County Deed Book 73, page 493 as "commencing at the northwest corner of that certain tract of land described in the deed from the Rocky Mountain and Santa Fe Railway Company to the Board of Education of the City of Raton, New Mexico, and which is duly recorded in the office of the County Clerk of Colfax County, New Mexico, in Deed Book 73 at Page 304, thence south along the western line of said tract a distance of 238 feet, thence east at right angles a distance of 180 feet, thence North at right angles a distance of 170 feet, thence East at right angles a distance of 85 feet, thence North at right angles a distance of 215 feet to the north line of said tract first mentioned thence along the north line of said tract first mentioned to the place of beginning.
