
This house, while having been altered through the years, still retains a sufficient amount of its original fabric that it should be recognized and retained. We are therefore including it for its architectural significance, for its association with the exploration and settlement of the Bergen County area, and for its remaining historic fabric. As such, it is included in the Thematic Nomination to the National Register of Historic Places for the Early Stone Houses of Bergen County, New Jersey.





Terhune-Hopper House 349 West Saddle River Road, Upper Saddle River





Isaiah Valleau sold this 330 acre tract to Albert Terhune on October 27, 1746 but it is doubted that his early house exists in this one. A stone with the date "176\_" (obliterated) is in the cellar of the next old house (c. 1820) to the north (which was a descendant's) and may be the datestone of the house referred to in Albert A. Terhune's will of 1795 as "my old dwelling house". Although no house is shown on the 1783 map, he mentioned three other "messuages and tenaments" in the will. He left the homestead to his wife Elizabeth and son John Albert, who was born in 1753, married Catharine and had Albert, Harmon, Stephen (died young) and Elizabeth. Albert, born 1781, inherited the homestead and then it went to his brother Harmon (who lived in the house with the 176\_datestone). He gave (?) it to his daughter Elizabeth, born 1824, and her husband, John Eckerson Hopper, who were married in 1846, the year Hopper is listed as owner. The Wood family bought it in 1915 (1913?) from the Holland Realty Company. Nephew Dallas Taylor inherited it.
