DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

The principal facade of Rockwell faces South. This clapboard structure stands two stories on a full basement story. The material of the basement is stucco over stone rubble. The columns of the central ionic portico rise from the top of a long flight of steps and extend a full two stories to an entablature which supports a pediment. Filling the pediment is an elliptical fan window in an arched frame with a central keystone. The four columns of the portico are fluted and arranged in pairs. A two story wood pilaster with doric cap flanks each side of the entrance at the rear of the portico.

The main door is on the center line of the house. The eight panel door is double ar flanked by leaded sidelights with elliptical fanlight above. A similar fanlight and sidelight is repeated directly above around the door to the second story balcony. This balcony has a decorative iron railing with Greek details, and the floor of the balcony is trimmed with a Greek fret design.

The windows on the principal facade are 12 over 12 lights and are arranged two on either side of the central portico. This arrangement is repeated on the second story and in the basement story. The front steps are not the original. They were replaced by the present owner who says he copied the original. The steps as they now appear are wood with diamond shaped holes in the risers.

Extending from both the east and west sides of the house, to the North are wings with small one story porticos. From the top of a flight of steps two fluted doric columns rise to support an entablature. At the back of each portico are two pilasters, one on each side of the door.

The rear facade features a central porch with hip roof. The floor of the porch is reached by a flight of steps. The outer door to the porch has a rectangular transom above it with small lights. The porch features very handsome wooden louvre shutters which begin about one foot from floor level and rise to the height of the top of the back door on all three sides of the porch. The main rear entrance to the house is reached through this porch and is on center line with the front door. It also has a fanlight and sidelights.

The Samuel Rockwell House has a four room, divided central hall plan. The front door leads into the front stairhall. An oval spiral stair begins on the eastern wall and curves against the wall to the second floor. The stair railing is grained. The two front rooms open into this hall. A door on the wall opposite the entrance leads to the back hall.

The walls are plaster through out the house. In the hall there is a wood paneled wainscoting. The doors to the two front rooms are very fine and are framed by side panels and entablature. The center block of the entablature and corner blocks of the side panels feature carved fret and anthemion designs derived from Minard Lafever's design books.

The Southwest front room also has a wood wainscot. The windows are enframed by side panels and end blocks which repeat in simplified form the panels around the front hall doors. The southwest front room is separated from

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

The significance of Rockwell House is architectural. Its doorway with its graceful elliptical fanlight and curving stairway reflect the finest of the Federal Milledgeville houses, but its Lafever derived details, balcony, and pedimented portico belong to the Greek Revival period. The house then becomes an important example of the transition from the Federal to the Greek Revival style. The Henry DuPont Winterthur Museum felt the house to be of such architectural importance that it removed the woodwork from the Northwest room and installed it as the "Georgia" room at its complex in Delaware.

The house was built for Col. Samuel Rockwell in 1838. This date is supported by a significant jump in valuation which occurs in the County Tax Digest for Samuel Rockwell between 1838 and 1839.

The architect was Joseph Lane, Sr. who was also the architect for the Greek Revival Central Building at Oglethorpe University, just a few miles up the road from the Rockwell House. This commission was also granted in 1838. Family tradition has connected the elder Lane with the Rockwell's, but a lien against Samuel Rockwell in Lane's Estate papers of 1842 gives the necessary documentation. A glance at Lane's inventory at death indicates that he was a builder as well as designer, having on hand tools of the building trade, lumber, hardware, doors and glass. Cook writes in her <u>History of Baldwin County</u> that Jospph Lane and his som, Joseph Lane, Jr. came to Milledgeville from Portland, Maine in 1837. Some references have associated Lane with Savannah, but no mention of him has as yet turned up in Savannah to verify that theory. After the death of the senior Lane in 1842 in Milledgeville, his son continued the business and among the stuctures completed by him was Thalian Hall at Oglethorpe University.

SAMUEL ROCKWELL was the 7th generation of Rockwells in America. He was born in 1788 in Albany, New York and died in Milledgeville in 1842. His death notice which appeared on August 17th, 1841 in the Savannah <u>Georgian</u> stated "Died at his residence near Milledgeville on Wednesday, the 4th Inst. Col. Samuel Rockwell, endowed with a high order of intellect, and having for many years been a leading member of the bar, his absence will be sensibly felt by the community. He was buried with masonic and military honors."

the northwest room by a rectangular opening. The center block and side blocks of the enframement repeat the Lafever derived motifs that ornament the entrance hall door enframements. This elaborate woodwork also enframes the door leading from the front southwest room to the entrance hall. The doors between the western rooms were sliding, however they and all the wainscoting and Lafever derived woodwork have been removed from the northwest room and have been installed in the Winterthur Museum in Delaware as the Georgia Room. No copy or replacement has been made for this room as of 1976. The mantel in the southwest front room is black marble veined with yellow. A horizontal, rectangular jamb with rectangular corner blocks and a paneled center block is supported by Ionic columns. The mantel shelf is rectangular.

In the Eastern rooms the woodwork is simpler. The doors and windows are enframed by a wide moulding and cornerblocks with carved bulleyes. The detail of the bulleyes and moulding varies from room to room. The east front room has a white marble mantel. A rectangular shelf is supported on a horizontal jamb and square cornerblocks with bulleyes. The horizontal jamb and side jambs are fluted. The east rear room has a black marble mantel. The horizontal jamb has square corner blocks with a carved square in the center and a large center block with carved intersecting rectangles as decoration. The side jambs are plain. All the fireplaces have rectangular openings which have been filled in for coal.

The rear hall into which the northern rooms open contains a stair to the second floor and one to the basement(enclosed). The stair rail to the second floor is also grained.

The upstairs front hall repeats the trim of the downstairs entrance hall. Paneled double doors open to the balcony. The two southern upstairs rooms have closets, a chair rail moulding, deep baseboard topped with a moulding. The marble mantels on this second floor are unornamented, a plain horizontal jamb and plain rectangular side jambs.

Leading from the front rooms to the back rooms on the second floor is a door set deep in a plaster arch. This space is created by the presence of the closets.

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The Northeastern and Northwestern upstairs rear rooms open into a back service hall which contains stairs to the attic also with grained stairrail.

There is considerable fire and smoke damage to the upstairs portion of Rockwell. The upperstairwell front, and western upstairs rooms are the most affected. The present owners are in the process of restoration. The chimneys have been rebuilt above the roofline.

The basement has been altered for an apartment and is vacant at present.

Samuel Rockwell served in the Georgia Militia as Inspector of the 3rd Division and Adjutant General under General Sanford during the Creek Indian War (1836).

Prior to his law practice in Milledgeville he served as an attorney in Savannah, announcing in the <u>Daily Georgian</u> in 1820 that he and Joseph L. Hepburn had formed a law office under the firm name of Rockwell and Hepburn. The notice also stated that they would be willing to work in several other counties including Baldwin. By 1828 Samuel Rockwell was a slave holder and land owner in Baldwin County., and by 1831 owned property in Milledgeville proper.

Samuel Rockwell was on the building committee for the first buildings at the State Lunatic Asylum.

A name frequently associated incorrectly with the construction of Rockwell is W. S. Rockwell. This is William Spencer Rockwell (1809-1870) who was Samuel Rockwell's son and also an attorney.

AMENDMENT Samuel Rockwell House, Milledgeville, Baldwin County, Georgia

Description:

Attached is a sketch map indicating the approximate location of the outbuildings and their original and present usage.

According to the present owners, the fire in question occurred about the time they acquired the house, 1968-69. The fire was started during their attempts to clean the upstairs portion of the house.

Geographical Data:

Attached is a plat map and citation which is marked as to where the nominated property should end. The owners requested that the land extending back to the pond be included in the nomination. This land to the right borders on property owned by the Board of Education; and the owners believe that National Register designation would offer them a degree of protection from possible encroachment by the school.

Since the redefined boundary reduces the acreage from 10.32 to approximately 6 acres, only one UTM is required (Zone 17/291460/3659590). Our Georgia National Register Review Board does not require that a nominated property be resubmitted for review when acreage is reduced. The plat map should serve as the Verbal Boundary Description.




