DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

The Homestead is a 2-story, 30 ft. square log saltbox built in 1886. The logs were felled, barked, and adzed by the owner with the assistance of Jim Goodwin. It is believed to be the oldest house in Flagstaff. The white clapboard over the logs was added by McMillan in 1888 when he married.

After McMillan's death, the house deteriorated until it was purchased and restored in 1927 by Dr. Harold S. Colton. The two straddle ridge chimneys for the living and dining room fireplaces remain, but the chimney for the kitchen stove has been removed. The shingle roof has been replaced.

Both the upstairs and downstairs front porches are supported by 6 turned posts. The decorative railing on the upstairs porch has been retained, but its height has been doubled.

The downstairs porch railing has been replaced by stone. The original upstairs front door remains. It has two wood panels below and two arched glass panels above. The first floor door, however, has been replaced by one with three vertical panels topped by 6 square panes.

The 1927 restoration added shutters to all the windows. An upstairs storage room window, which had been sealed, has been restored. A window in the den on the first floor has been converted to a french door.

In the rear of the second floor, a shed dormer has been added to accommodate the bathrooms.

The house was restored again in 1956 by the Museum of Northern Arizona, which now owns it.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

The Homestead is an attractive 2-story, log saltbox covered with white clapboard and built in 1886 by prominent Flagstaff settler Thomas F. McMillan.

Thomas Forsythe McMillan (1832-1906) was a native of Mount Pleasant, Tennessee and a nephew of the wife of President James K. Polk.

As a young man, McMillan went to California to prospect for gold and then to Australia, where he raised sheep for a few years before returning to California.

In the 1870s he took up land in Flagstaff, becoming the first permanent settler in the area. On a homestead 3 miles north of Flagstaff, he engaged in sheep raising and had about 85 acres under cultivation. In 1888 McMillan married Katherine Donnelly Anderson, a widow in San Francisco who had a seven-year-old son. The McMillans had three children.

McMillan was a prominent local citizen who served as a member of the first Board of Supervisors of Coconino County in 1891 and for several terms thereafter. McMillan had been active in the move (1888-1891) to create Coconino County out of a portion of Yavapai County, which was too large to be easily administered.

Although Flagstaff was not incorporated until 1894, McMillan showed his faith in the town's future by building the Bank Hotel. The hotel was a terminal for the stage to Grand Canyon and the McMillan ranch, where the Homestead is located, was a watering place for the stage. The Homestead was acquired by Dr. Harold S. Colton in 1927 and was donated to the Museum of Northern Arizona in 1946.

Dr. Colton had been a professor of zoology in Pennsylvania but after several trips to Arizona decided to settle in Flagstaff in 1926. He had then already done considerable archaeological work in northern Arizona, and when the founding of a museum was

suggested, he and his wife were among the most active supporters of the new enterprise. Dr. Colton served as director of the museum until he retired in 1958. The land on which the present museum stands was donated by Mrs. Colton and was once part of the McMillan Ranch. The McMillan Homestead was also donated to the museum by Mrs. Colton and serves as a residence for the director.
