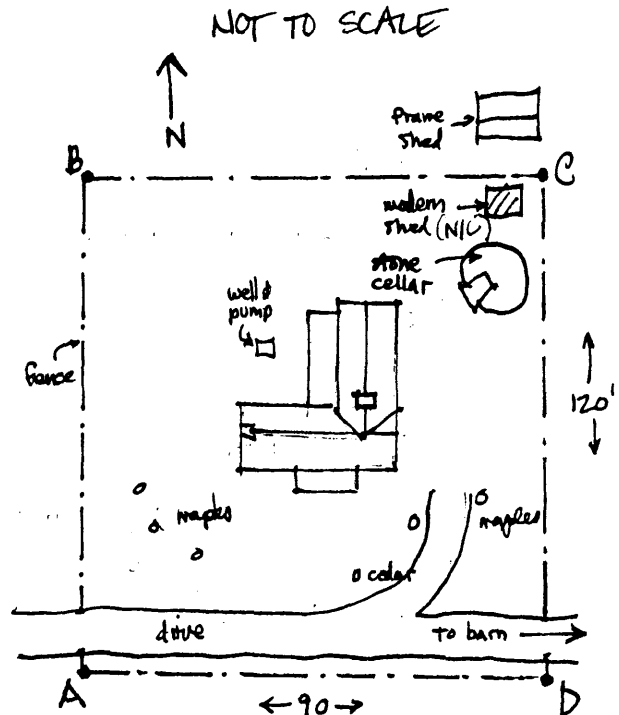

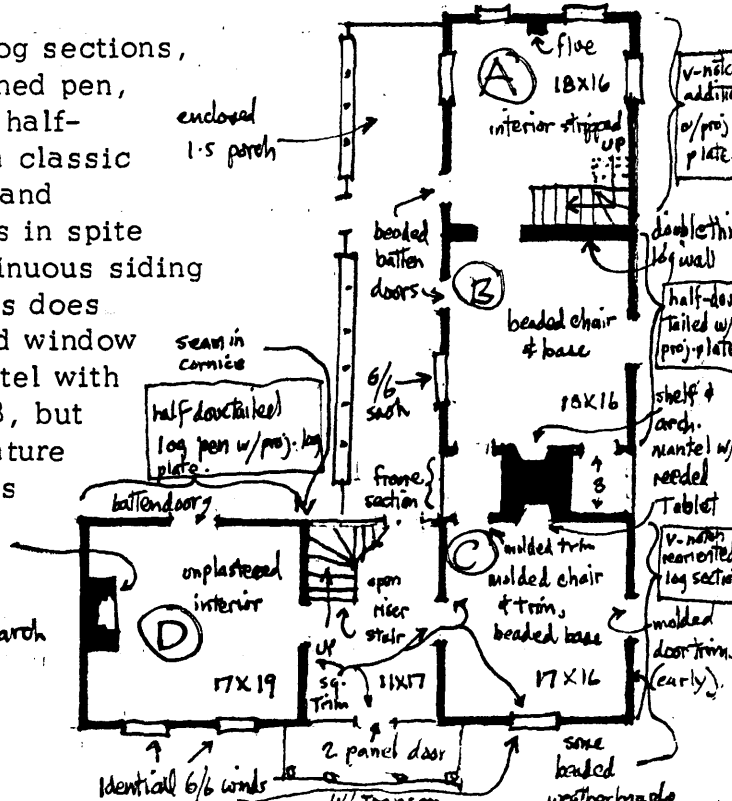
Beginning at A, north 120' along a fence to B, thence east 90' along a fence to C, thence 120' south along a fence to D, thence 90' west along a fence to the point of origin. The boundaries were chosen to include the house and its domestic-related space enclosed by fences and including a contributing stone cellar and a non-contributing modern frame shed. Not included in the boundaries are a frame shed to the north and a barn to the southeast.

Point A is located at the intersection of two fences in the southwestern corner of the yard and is five feet south of the southern edge of the drive



45. Description and House Plan:

House consists of 4 discreet 1-story rectangular log sections, identified as A, B, C, and D. Section C, a V-notched pen, shares a massive stone chimney with section B, a half-dovetailed pen with projecting log plates forming a classic saddlebag form sharing early 19th century details and suggesting roughly contemporary construction dates in spite of the dissimilar jointing techniques and non-continuous siding on the east wall. Section C originally faced east as does section B, and contains molded chairrail, door and window trim, beaded base, and a shelf and architrave mantel with a central tablet. The mantel is similar in section B, but the chairrail and trim are beaded. Both mantels feature a circular cut-out in the central tablet and brackets supporting the shelf. The east front of section C features wide beaded weatherboards, while the north gable end of B (now enclosed) has beaded weatherboards w/ stone jack arch.

resulting in the reorientation of the house and its transformation to a center-passage plan. The building retains much of its original woodwork. It has a period of significance of 1800-1850.

and beaded, tapered rakeboards. A passage and closet flanking the chimney have been framed in. Both rooms are fully plastered. In the mid-19th century section D, a large half-dovetailed log pen with projecting plates, appears to have been constructed to the west of section C, and the two linked by a frame center passage. Detailing of the passage does not suggest an enclosed dogtrot. The unplastered interior of section D contains square trim and architrave, and a Greek Revival type of pilastered mantel on a large fireplace. The stone chimney stands at the west end, and the firebox is spanned by a stone jack arch. Two-panel doors open into the passage from sections D and C as well as the exterior, and it features square trim at the openings and an open stringer stair to a finished garret. In the creation of the center-passage form facing south, section C was reoriented by adding a 6/6 window on the south end, the roof removed, and the section placed under a new roof spanning across the passage from section D. This is clear by examining the siding in the present east gable of section C. At some point an additional V-notched pen (section A) with projecting log plates had been constructed abutting the north wall of section B. Its interior has been largely stripped and a chimney at the north end removed. An enclosed stair in the southeast corner has a beaded batten door. Both section A and section B have access through beaded batten doors to an enclosed porch along their west walls, giving the overall house approximately the form of a typical center-passage house with two-room ell and rear porch. Questions about the actual construction sequence of the house are raised by the variety of notching techniques, and by the existence of a seam in the cornice on the north wall at the junction of section D and the frame passage.

Outbuildings:

Included is a contributing stone root cellar. It demonstrates the use of exterior food storage structures when not provided under house.

The nominated area includes two contributing and one non-contributing buildings.
