Originally five rooms with central hall. Ceilings are 11'3". Sills and joists are pegged. Front porch altered during Victorian era and now screened in. Other alterations include: 1 additional room in 1910; back porch remodelled in 1910; the kitchen remodelled in 1964. Brick chimneys. House in excellent condition. Frame and brick outbuildings are to the north of the house, several dating back to the mid-nineteenth century. Massee Lane remains as a (continued) Current Use Residence and Farm Historic Use Residence and Farm 1910: Construction Date 1827 Architect/Builder Needham Massee Date of Alterations 1964 Historical Narrative: Needham Massee moved to the Marshallville area in 1827, building Massee plantation at that time. Originally his land, which was planted with cotton, extended from Marshallville to Fort Valley. In 1851, Massee donated part of his land as right-of-way for the railroad, with the condition that Massee Lane be a stop. Six generations of the Massee family have lived at the plantation. SIGNIFICANCE Settlement; Transportation Areas of Significance Agriculture; ArchitectuStatement of Significance: Like the Billy Place and Thronateeska, Massee Plantation is important in the early settlement of Macon County and as a very early example of vernacular architecture. Massee's success with cotton encouraged other settlers and planters to move into the area. Because of the large number of remaining outbuildings connected with the farm, Massee Plantation exists as the best intact example of an operating farm in Marshallville. Finally, the location of the railroad also brought settlers into the region and insured the community's prominence in the area.
