

The Gilmer Heitman House, located at 2581 First Street in Ft. Myers, is a stately 5,300 square foot, two and one-half story, Queen Anne style residence, completed in 1908. Its modified rectangular plan is dominated by a composition shingle, hip roof broken by secondary roof structures, including two dormers and a chimney. The house rests on a foundation of brick A pierced brick perimeter wall runs between the piers at piers. the foundation level. The chimney, centrally located on the west slope, has a corbelled brick cap. The walls are finished with weatherboard. The house provides an excellent representation of the scale and style of architecture selected by Ft. Myers' most prominent businessmen and civic leaders for use in the construction of their personal residences, in the early part of The Heitman House contributes to the Historic the 20th Century. Resources of Lee County, Florida, 1881-1945, multiple property group under property type F.1, Residential Buildings.

SETTING

The Gilmer Heitman House sits back approximately fifty feet from First Street. The landscaped lawn is punctuated by stately Royal Palms. A broad, brick walk leads from the sidewalk to the house.

The rear of the house overlooks the Caloosahatchee River (Photo 1). The Edison Bridge crosses the river just to the east of the Heitman House (Photo 16). A contemporary brick walk, centered and aligned perpendicular to the home, leads from the rear of the house to a contemporary wood dock extending into the river.

EXTERIOR DESCRIPTION

The main facade of the Heitman House faces south (Photo 2). A two-story, pedimented, projecting entrance bay is centrally located on this facade. The primary entrance consists of paired wood doors with glass panels, surmounted by a transom. Three large double-hung sash windows are centered above the main doorway at the second level, providing access to the porch deck via the windows (Photo 3). This deck has a balustrade consisting

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of turned spindles between square wood posts. The pedimented entrance bay contains a louvered vent in the peak of the gable.

The first floor porch, approximately ten feet in depth, extends almost entirely around the house. It has a shallowpitched hip roof with a denticulated molding at the top of the fascia (Photo 4). Paired Ionic columns, resting on brick piers, support the porch roof (Photo 5). Wood windows are regularly spaced on both the first and second floors. Throughout the house they generally are double-hung sash, with diamond pattern top sashes.

The southeast corner of the porch curves outward, accommodating a two-story bay window that terminates in a bracketed eave projecting over the denticulated fascia (Photo 6). The bay is surmounted by a balustrade like that over the main entrance. A small gabled dormer is centrally located on the east roof slope.

Double wood doors with a transom and side lights are centrally located on the rear (north) elevation (Photo 7). These entrances are sheltered by the porch that extends across most of this elevation. West of the central doorway is another transom door, flanked by double-hung sash windows, leading to the library. A group of three wood casement windows is centrally located on the second floor of this elevation. Just east of these windows is a projecting sleeping porch with a shed roof. Originally screened, the porch openings are now filled with glass. A gabled dormer is centrally located on the north roof slope, fenestrated with paired, 1/1, wood, double hung sash windows.

The porch connects at the east end of the rear (north) elevation with the off-set, one-story, kitchen block (Photo 8). A short breezeway originally linked the house and the kitchen block. The breezeway was enclosed in 1994. The enclosure of the breezeway shares the characteristics of design and material with the main building. Originally, a small, corbelled brick chimney pierced the east facing gable of the hip roofed structure. The chimney was removed in 1994 and replaced with a wood-sided chimney cap. Projecting from the east wall of the kitchen block is an attached, small, frame, shed-like structure with a gable roof that at one time housed the steam heat furnace.

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INTERIOR DESCRIPTION

The most significant interior feature of the fourteen room house is its woodwork, including classically influenced columns, paneled dados, paneled ceilings, window moldings, baseboards, and the four ornate wooden fireplace surrounds and mantles with tile hearths.

The interior is designed to provide a dramatic view from the primary (south) entrance, through the house, to the river (Photo 9). The front half of the first floor consists of a long parlor, extending the width of the house (Photo 10). A stairway to the second floor is located at the west end of this room (Photo 11). The rear half of the first floor contains a library and a dining room (Photo 12). A back-to-back fireplace at the west end of the parlor (Photo 11) also services the library (Photo 13). The dining room is accessed from the central hall, the parlor, and the kitchen.

The second floor contains four bedrooms (Photos 14 and 15), a bath, and a sleeping porch. The attic contains four storage rooms.

In 1993 and 1994, the Gilmer Heitman House was substantially rehabilitated by its present owner, retaining its original architectural integrity. It is presently in excellent physical condition.

NON-CONTRIBUTING BUILDING

The original two-story garage/apartment was demolished in 1994, because it was extremely deteriorated. It is believed that this structure was constructed later than the house, although its date is unknown. It was replaced with a new frame, garage/apartment that replicates many of the design features of the house. At the same time, a covered brick walkway was created to link the garage with the kitchen block (Photos 16 and 17).

The residence at 2577 First Street, Fort Myers, Florida was built for Gilmer Heitman, Sr., a prominent early Ft. Myers businessman and civic leader. Completed in 1908, the Heitman House fulfills Criterion B and C at the local level for listing in the National Register for Historic Places. Under Criterion B, the house is significant as the home of Gilmer Heitman, who played an important role in the commercial development of Fort Myers. Under Criterion C, the house is a significant local example of the Queen Anne style and is one of the largest and most elaborate early 20th Century residences in Fort Myers. The house is consistent with national and state-wide trends in architecture, and has maintained a high level of architectural integrity. It contributes to the Historic Resources of Lee County, Florida, 1881-1945 multiple property group under historic context II, Agricultural and Industrial Expansion, 1896-1918 and associated property type F.1, Residential Buildings.

HISTORIC SIGNIFICANCE

During the period 1896-1918, Lee County underwent significant growth and development. Growth in tourism, citrus production, and other agricultural pursuits sparked a building boom that resulted in the construction of a number of fine residences, commercial buildings, and numerous improvements in Fort Myers' infrastructure. Improved roads and railroad facilities facilitated the export of locally produced goods and made the county more accessible to visitors. As a result, Fort Myers' population expanded from 943 in 1900, to 3,678 in 1920.

One of those drawn to Fort Myers by the agricultural and industrial expansion was Harvie E. Heitman. Heitman arrived from Lexington, North Carolina in 1888, to work in his great-uncle's general store. After the business went bankrupt in 1893, he worked in Key West for almost a year before returning to Ft. Myers to open his own small general store. In 1896, Harvie Heitman was joined in the business by his younger brother, Gilmer McCrary Heitman. The two brothers continued in many partnerships together until Harvie's death 25 years later.

Gilmer Heitman was born in 1881 in Lexington, North Carolina, and attended Lexington public schools. One of his first ventures, upon arriving in Ft. Myers, involved the purchase and development of a citrus grove, which he later sold at a large

profit. Shortly thereafter, Heitman, only eighteen years old, realized that a need existed in Lee County for local telephone service. He invested his citrus grove profits in establishing Lee County's first telephone service, and in January 1900, obtained a franchise from the County Commission to maintain telephone service throughout the county. He opened the telephone exchange on the second floor of his new commercial building, the Heitman Building (extant), at First and Jackson. He continued to maintain ownership of the Lee County Telephone Company until 1924.

Once his telephone service was established, Gilmer Heitman left Ft. Myers to complete his education, taking a business course at the Sullivan-Crichton Business College in Atlanta, Georgia. After graduation, he returned to Ft. Myers and became involved in numerous other business ventures. He established the Mutual Realty Company and Home Insurance Company, was instrumental in constructing a new post office, and was involved in the development of many subdivisions between Ft. Myers and Tice, Florida. He is credited with developing the town of Bonita Springs and the construction of the Bonita Hotel. He opened the Heitman Clothing Company and had a financial interest in a hardware business, the Heitman-Evans Company. He became Vice President and a Director of the Bank of Fort Myers & Trust Company. Heitman's business activities also included the management of the Royal Palm Hotel in Ft. Myers. Over the years, Heitman undertook several other business enterprises, including ownership of a cattle ranch and operation of a packing house. He also acquired the South Florida Ford automobile agency.

On June 18, 1908, Heitman married Nina Alice Travers, the sister of one of his closest friend, Englishman Mark Travers. Following the death of his parents, Travers had been appointed guardian of his six year old sister, Nina. She remained in England for her eduction, but when she was eighteen, she joined her brother in the United States. Her marriage to Gilmer Heitman was considered the social highlight of the season in Ft. Myers.

Heitman began construction of a home on First Street, near the downtown area, in late 1907 or early 1908. Designed by an unidentified Tampa architect, the house incorporated the latest in improvements and was considered ahead of its time. The Heitmans moved into the fourteen-room house in 1908, when they returned from their honeymoon. Although their home was well

suited for entertainment, they lived a quiet life. Heitman's business activities left little time for social activities. Mrs. Heitman entertained friends for lunch or tea and was active in the Episcopal Church. The Heitmans had two children, Gilmer Jr. and Dorothy. Their father was very family oriented and spent all his available time with his wife and children, including them in all his travels - even a tour of Europe. In the fall of 1908, Gilmer Heitman purchased the first automobile brought to Ft. Myers.

While Heitman did suffer some financial setbacks during the Depression, he was, in time, able to meet all his obligations while concentrating on reviving his business interests. In 1935, Heitman formed the Franklin Arms Hotel Company and purchased the historic Franklin Arms Hotel (Fort Myers Downtown Commercial District, NR 1990). In the early 1940s, Heitman served as a director of the Lee County Bank, which had been organized in 1934, and as a director of the Lee County Chamber of Commerce. In addition, he was an officer in the Ft. Myers Rotary Club, and was President of the Caloosa Grove and Improvement Company and West Coast Land Company.

Gilmer Heitman, Jr., followed his father's footsteps and became active in the Fort Myers business community. He served as trustee of his father's estate. Gilmer Heitman, Jr. and his family took up residency in the house after the elder Heitman died in 1960. The house remained in family ownership until 1993. The Heitman family played a significant role in the business, community, and civic affairs of early Ft. Myers. Gilmer, Sr. was honored for his contributions to the city and county by the naming of Heitman Street in downtown Ft. Myers.

ARCHITECTURAL SIGNIFICANCE

The Gilmer Heitman House is one of only three surviving, stately early-twentieth century residences that once lined the Caloosahatchee riverfront near the city's commercial core. It is an excellent example of the Queen Anne Style, which was the predominant style of choice for large-scale residences in Ft. Myers between 1890 and 1910. The building is virtually unaltered and is well-preserved and maintained.


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
