Describe Present and Historic Physical Appearance.

#### Exterior

Beth El Synagogue is a domed buff-brick building in a 20th-century interpretation of the Byzantine style. It faces east across the street from Lewis Fulton Memorial Park in an early-20th-century residential neighborhood close to downtown Waterbury.

The synagogue is approached by a long run of wide front steps, flanked by brick and stone parapets, which lead up to triple rectangular doorways. The doorways, framed in elaborate foliate carvings, support a Decalogue which is positioned against the top of the wall of the central section of the building, rather than projecting above the roof line. The recessed central section is flanked by slightly lower brick masses which project and which have arcaded fenestration of narrow round-arched windows with enriched columns and capitals. The principal mass of the synagogue is behind the front sections and higher. Its roof supports a large gold-colored dome. All other roofs are flat. The dome has cresting at its apex in the form of a ring of acanthus-leaf acroteria surrounding a central copper finial. Below the cornice of the lower projecting sections is a brick zigzag pattern, while in the corresponding position of the main block the brick are laid in a large diamond diaper pattern.

State Significance of Property, and Justify Criteria, Criteria Considerations, and Areas and Periods of Significance Noted Above.

### Architectural Significance

Beth El Synagogue is significant architecturally because it is the first synagogue built in Connecticut in the Byzantine style. The Byzantine style was considered appropriate for synagogue design because of its association with the East, where Judaism had its origins, and the probability that early synagogues in that region were built in the Byzantine style.

At the same time, the architecture of Beth El has two other components of interest. First, the design did not lose all touch with Connecticut's traditional Romanesque Revival features. At Beth El there continues to be a wide flight of steps leading up to a triple entranceway in a central recessed section flanked by projecting masses.

#### Interior

In the sanctuary the wooden pews are divided by three aisles. The high space of the room is open to the dome under a slightly segmental ceiling. The front is treated as a stage with proscenium arch and canted walls covered with vertical wooden finish; the effect is contemporary, perhaps dating from the 1950s. The double door of the ark is paneled in a diamond pattern within a molded surround. Judaic symbols flank the opening, while above a Decalogue is defended by the Lions of Judah under an Eternal Light. Candelabra on either side of the ark enclosure are reminiscent of the menorah of the Temple of David. (Photograph 29) There is a gallery across the back of the room.

Second, the massing and detailing of the building reflect the influence of the contemporary Art Deco style, popular throughout the United States in the 1920s. The stepped massing of the building, its flat planar quality, and the reference to classical details are characteristic of the Art Deco, as are the pre-Columbian zigzag pattern and the diaper work in the brick walls below the cornices.

#### Historical Background

Beth El Synagogue is associated with the Conservative Beth El Congregation, which was organized ca.1920. Its former synagogue on Park Place is no longer standing. After the original design by Nathan Myers was carried out in 1928, completion of the interior proceeded slowly as funds became available. The interior finishes of the sanctuary were the work in the 1950s of Waterbury architect Joseph Stein, particularly the detailing of the paneling of the bimah and the carving around the ark. Joseph Stein practiced in Waterbury for many years, counting among his prominent commissions the Bronson [Waterbury Public] Library on Grand Street next to City Hall, ca.1960s, a Miesian composition, and the Superior Court building at 300 Grand Street.

#### Registration Requirements

Beth El Synagogue qualifies under Criterion C for inclusion in this multiple property listing as an urban building constructed as a synagogue in Connecticut by meeting the following requirements:
