DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

Located alongside the top of Bridal Veil Falls whose waters plunge over the edge of a 400-foot cliff, the Bridal Veil Powerhouse is a tripartite structure consisting of a two and one-half story generator and transformer plant, a one story cookhouse, and a one and one-half story residence. The shape of the building is irregular, the main facade has ten bays, and the structure is made of concrete and wood. The side of the generator and transformer plant has two bays along the side plus a gable with a single window; a brick chimney projects through the apex of the roof; the semi-polygonal projection on the main facade has a semi-conical roof. The residential structure is basically rectangular in shape with a hipped roof, two dormers, and a chimney. Between these two larger structures is the third building which is quite small, rectangular, and houses a hallway and two small rooms. The entire structure is anchored to the rock by a poured-concrete foundation.

The generator and transformer plant is the most distinctive part of the structure. The top one and one-half stories rest on a high concrete foundation. The foundation walls with the five tall, semi-circular fan windows house the generating room and give the structure much of its distinctive appearance. The exterior walls above are finished in shiplap cedar which has weathered well. The pitched roof and conical spire have tar shingles. The tower projection on the front, the building's most distinctive feature, comprises half the facade of this portion of the building and has been imitated by architects designing new houses in Telluride.

The interior of the entire structure, while partially vandalized and in disrepair, remains covered with expensive tongue-and-groove hardwood paneling. The generator itself, however, once laboriously dragged to the site with horses and block-and-tackle, has been ruined by vandals.

Nearby the structure lie several small outbuildings, flumes, and bridges. Among the outbuildings are the tool shed and the equipment and material warehouses as well as the ruins of an ore crushing mill operated by waterpower. Also remaining are the waterfall sluice gates which once diverted summer stream water into the turbine and created a second waterfall as the water left the generator.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

The Bridal Veil Powerhouse is significant for its association with the mining industry of Colorado, particularly the Smuggler-Union Mining Company, one of the state's most important producers in the late nineteenth and early twentieth centuries; for its association with important figures in the mining industry, such as James B. Grant, Nathaniel P. Hill, Richard Pearce, Anton Eilers, Bulkeley Wells, and Henry Lee Higginson, all of whom at one time owned part of the company and participated in its finance or management; for its unusual architectural features and spectacular setting which serves as a mecca for photographers, artists, and tourists; and for its pioneering role in the development of hydroelectric power used for industrial purposes in the United States.

Telluride was an important mining community in Colorado, and the Smuggler-Union Mining Company one of the most important producers in the area. The enterprise emerged from the combination of several claims located in the late 1880s, the most important properties being the Smuggler and the Union. Management found good veins of ore to exploit, investment capital flowed in to open the mines and build ancillary structures; and several groups of entrepreneurs alternately bought and sold control of the firm until it was finally purchased by the Idarado Mining Company, today a subsidiary of Newmont Mining Company, one of the world's largest producers of minerals.


The Bridal Veil Powerhouse owed its origin to the need of the Smuggler-Union Company for electric power. Bulkeley Wells, local manager at the time, initiated the project, convinced higher levels of management of the utility, and pushed construction through to completion. When opened in 1907, the plant housed a generator which provided the first alternating current (AC current) used for industrial purposes in the United States—in this particular case, for lighting mines and running mills. At least a portion of the water needed was flumed to the facility from Blue Lake, 3000 feet above and four miles away; then power was transmitted to the mines 2000 feet below. The plant operated year round, but as the road to it was impassible during the winter, the enterprise built an aerial tramway (now destroyed) to haul men and supplies up the precipice. The power-house remained in operation until 1953 when the Idarado Mining Company found it cheaper to purchase electricity from the coal-fired plants of the San Miguel Association. The only part of the plant in use today is the sluice and pipe system which still brings water down from Blue Lake to provide water for the Idarado

Because it lies above the magnificent Bridal Veil Falls, the Powerhouse has become important for photographers and artists. The distinctive architectural features enhanced by the cliffs below and the mountains above provide one of the most spectacular vistas in Colorado.
