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#### Describe the present and original (if known) physical appearance

The Joseph A. Woodbury House is a one and one half story frame entage, Gothic in form, dating to 1870. It is located near downtown Greeley, approximately three blocks from the Weld County Courthouse and one-half block from Greeley's original high school. The Woodbury House is the oldest residence in an older, well-kept neighborhood, where it occupies about 1 1/3 of its original two-lot space.

The building faces north toward Seventh Street and is somewhat symmetrical in appearance. It is characterized by a projecting central bay, which extends above the first floor to become a projecting gable, with a round-arched window centered in the middle and a decorative apex detail. The entrance is composed of double doors. To the east of the door, on the east end of the front wall, is a double hung window. The window on the west end has been altered. A one-story Colonial Revival porch with a central projecting pediment covers the first floor. In that the porch covers the front door transom, it is felt to be a later addition.

The east wall has a projecting bay on the first floor and double arched windows centered in the upper gable. The gable has a decorative apex detail. Adjoining the south wall is a one-story addition, with a bay at the south end of the east wall.

Extending to the west off the rear addition is another frame shed addition.

On the west wall is a window centered at the first level and, directly above, another at attic level. A decorative apex remains.

The original floor plan of the interior remains intact. The first floor of the  $l^1\!\!\!/_2$  story section contains a front vestibule, which leads into a large living room, behind which is another from. One room is placed on the west side of the house. In the one-story addition, there are two rooms, one of which is the kitchen. Most of the window and door molding survives, with remnants of the baseboard with a molded cap also remaining.

#### Statement of Significance (in one paragraph)

The Joseph Woodbury House, constructed in 1870-71, is one of the better examples of a Gothic cottage in Greeley, an agricultural community in north central Colorado.

The town was founded in 1870 by the Union Colony, a group of settlers organized by Nathan Meeker, a farm columnist for the New York Tribune, and Horace Greeley, owner of the Tribune. Meeker had advertised for subscribers to join the colony in 1869 with the intent of establishing a settlement in the rich flat land in the South Platte River Valley, some 45 miles north of Denver. Named for its patron, Greeley was seen as having exciting farming potential. 1

In May 1870, the first party of Union Colony settlers arrived, numbering around fifty. In the following months, several hundred others came, mainly from New England, New York, Ohio and Indiana, the majority of which were farmers. By 1871, the population had risen to 1,155. <sup>2</sup>

A likely recruit for the colony was Joseph A. Woodbury, from Beverly, Massachusetts. Born in 1832, it is said Woodbury apprenticed as a carpenter from 1850-53 in Chelsea, Massachusetts. After his move to Greeley in 1870, it is said he worked as a builder, responsible for the construction of the Greeley High School in 1872-74. He was to become Greeley's first chief of the fire department. In 1873, '86, '87, and '88, he was a member of the city council. In 1890, he was elected mayor, and elected again in 1897.3

The Woodbury House is located in an older neighborhood near the downtown commercial district of Greeley. The house is one of the earliest residences in the town and one of the best remaining examples of Gothic styling in Greeley. With its steeply pitched intersecting gables, the house is a clear representative of vernacular interpretation of Gothic architecture as would be expected to be found in the smaller communities of Colorado.
