Summary

The Pyeatte-Mason Cemetery is now located in a forested lot at the southwest corner of Waterside Street and Lily Street in the City of Maumelle. It contains ten historic burials directly associated with the early community of Crystal Hill.

Elaboration

The Pyeatte-Mason Cemetery is now located in a forested lot at the southwest corner of Waterside Street and Lily Street in the City of Maumelle, among the modern subdivisions that now make up this suburban community. It contains ten historic burials directly associated with the early community of Crystal Hill. The burials are largely placed in a single row, with one or two being placed to the north of this main row. While two of the burials have not been positively identified, the rest of the grave markers are slabs of stone, with simple block letter engraving and no adornment. On three of the headstones, the name and birth date are inscribed; only two gravestones reveal death dates. Andrew Scott's tombstone records both the earliest birth date ("NO

1807") and the earliest death date ("AU 1818"), while Jemina Scott's death date is the latest, given as 1883. The Pyeatte-Mason Cemetery -- now located in the City of Maumelle -- is eligible under Criterion A as the remaining historic resource directly associated with the early territorial-era community of Crystal Hill, Arkansas.

State significance of property, and justify criteria, criteria

Elaboration

The town of Crystal Hill, Arkansas, was established as a frontier village

settlement in 1812 when two families from northern Alabama arrived in central Arkansas and settled there. The Pyeattes and Carnahans made the long arduous journey from Alabama by boat, using the Tennessee, Ohio, Mississippi, and Arkansas Rivers as highways. The families arrived at the Arkansas Post in May of 1811, but apparently chose to continue traveling almost one hundred more miles up the Arkansas River before selecting homesteads. Continuing north a short distance after reaching a geophysical formation called Crystal Hill, the Pyeattes and Carnahans stopped and together purchased approximately 935 acres near the Arkansas River to call their new home.

Their frontier town of Crystal Hill was the first village settlement in what would later become known as Pulaski County. The inhabitants of Crystal Hill were proud of their community and, in 1819, proposed Crystal Hill as the first capitol of the newly created Arkansas Territory. Congress, however, chose the long standing site of Arkansas Post as the territorial capitol, although the seat of government was moved to the young town of Little Rock in 1821. While never the capitol, Crystal Hill did have the honor of providing the first territorial governor, landowner and resident James Miller, who resided here during his brief tenure.

The Crystal Hill community grew steadily, and on May 6, 1820, was awarded its own post office--only two months after Little Rock received one. This post office, granted only eight years after the town was founded by the Pyeattes and Carnahans, was either the third or fourth post office in the Arkansas Territory.

With the arrival of these two families also came the presence of the Presbyterian Church to central Arkansas. The Pyeattes and Carnahans were members of an evangelical branch of the Presbyterian Church of America called the Cumberland Presbyterian Church, which had grown out of the Tennessee- and Kentucky-based Great Revival of 1800. In November of 1812, shortly after his arrival in the Crystal Hill area, John Carnahan traveled to Kentucky to attend a meeting of the presbytery of the Cumberland Presbyterian Church. At this meeting, Carnahan was received as a candidate for the ministry and commanded to gather congregations, thereby forming "a circuit on the Arkansas, in the bounds of those settlements in which he lives."

Returning to Crystal Hill either in late 1812 or early 1813, John Carnahan appears to have carried out his orders promptly. Gathering the Pyeatte and Carnahan families at the home of Jacob Pyeatte, the new minister preached not only his first sermon, but the first one believed to be given by a Protestant clergyman on Arkansas soil. In 1821, near the home of James Pyeatte, the Carnahan patriarch conducted a "camp meeting," which is also supposed to have been the first one of its kind held in Arkansas Territory.

The property proposed for listing in the National Register is presently located on the corner of Waterside Street and Lily Street in the city of Maumelle, and contains the family cemetery of James and Katherine Pyeatte. There are ten graves, and while there is evidence of vandalism of one grave, the damage does not appear to have been enough to affect the overall integrity of the site. It remains today as evidence of Crystal Hill's

founding families and the significant role they played in settling the frontier of the Arkansas Territory by providing leadership and stability for families in central Arkansas.

The Pyeatte-Mason Cemetery is the only extant historic resource directly associated with the Crystal Hill Settlement and, although a cemetery, is thus eligible under Criterion A with local significance.






