	This house, while having been altered through the years, still retains a sufficient amount of its original fabric that it should be recognized and retained. We are therefore including it for its architectural significance, for its association with the exploration and settlement of the Bergen County area, and for its remaining historic fabric. As such, it is included in the Thematic Nomination to the National Register of			

Historic Places for the Early Stone Houses of Bergen County, New Jersey.

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This sandstone house stands on the westerly part of lot 5 to which the Blauvelts had title in the division with Jacob Flierboom in 1746.

Arie Blauvelt, son of Garret H. Blauvelt one of the original purchasers, took approximately 152 acres at this location, for which he received a release from his father on April 7, 1741; and a deed from his brother, Johannes G. Blauvelt, on June 8, 1748. He is thought to have built his homestead on this land about the time of his marriage in 1737, or at least prior to his Will in 1748.

Garret A. Blauvelt, son of Arie, received the homestead and the south third of the farm by his father's Will in 1748. He sold to Garret Demarest from adjoining lot 6, between 1769 and 1775, and it then became the home of his son, Theunis G. Demarest. He died in 1794 and at his father's death in 1798, the Blauvelt house and farm were devised to a other son, Jacobus G. Demarest, who also received the adjoining land in lot 6. At his death in 1842, the land in lot 5 was sold to Conrad P. Bush.

The original main part of sandstone was a small "three-quarter" size with front door and hallway at the side, instead of middle as usually found in larger houses. A frame kitchen wing attached to the east. The front facade was later covered with plaster and whitewashed. In more recent times, the house was increased in size, dormers placed in the roof and a porch across the front.
