A storm door has been installed at the main entrance, but the original paneled, double doors remain. There are also paneled reveals and six-panel doors on the interior. Several out-buildings are on the site, including a log barn with half-dovetail notching. The remaining frame structures, including a chicken coop, summer kitchen and privy date from the late 19th and early 20th centuries and are vernacular, farm out-buildings.
