Describe present and historic physical appearance.

Built on the town square in the central business district, this post office is situated on a 29,956 square foot site on the west side of the town square. The Post Office is an imposing structure that dominates the corners of College and First Streets. It contains approximately 10,570 square feet of interior space. Directly across First Street and facing the Post Office is the fifteen year old brick Gibson County Courthouse. To the right of the Post Office are small businesses and to the left is the Sovran Bank.

When the Post Office was built in 1935, it was rectangular with five bays across the front. During the expansion of 1966, another bay was added when the Postmaster's offices were relocated to the opposite side of the building. Also added was a new swingroom which had previously been housed on a second Everything that had been on the second level was relegated to the first level. floor and the second level was converted to open workroom area. Additionally, the workroom was enlarged and the wood flooring was changed to block vinyl tile.

Unlike the facade of most simplified Greek revival styles, this particular structure is dominated by a central pavilion that is punctuated with a concrete entrance flanked by brass lights. It is approached by concrete steps that are guarded by iron rails.

The treatment of the customer lobby was well done. It blends very well with the original interior and carries over the theme of terrazzo floors, plaster walls and marble wainscot. Fourteen foot high ceilings are prevalent throughout the building.

Other significant features of the exterior are the belt courses around the bottom and upper portion of the building, six over six multiple pane windows, low horizontal massing, and low-height concrete and brick columns in the front of the facade.  $NI SIH_{dHII}$ SJSIII

Representing a Simplified Greek Revival of the 1930's, this vernacular style has become universal and is another of the architectural designs emanating from the Works Progress Administration (WPA). The Works Progress Administration (WPA) was implemented immediately after World War I to provide employment to starving young artists and craftsmen and to give a boost to a flagging economy. In addition to the employment of skilled artisans, this era also stressed quality workmanship, the use of quality materials, and focusing on enduring quality and lasting benefits.

It was designed in 1934 by Supervising Architect Louis A. Simon, Department of the Treasury, and constructed by George O. Von Nerta, Supervising Engineer, and built according to a standardized plan. The expansion plans were handled by George Awsumb & Sons, Memphis, Tennessee, and the construction was performed by Wadlington Brothers, Jackson, Tennessee.


The structure's uniqueness of style has not diminished through the years, nor has the Post Office Building been duplicated in the local community. Standing as a visible symbol of the Federal government's public works progressive construction program, it is considered a forerunner of its time.


Its universal features of low horizontal massing, central entrance configuration, multiple pane windows, and areas of five bays are characteristic of its era. Also, the same supervising architect, Louis A. Simon, was involved in a majority of the structure designs. Another significant point is that this design as well others were contributing factors to the street scapes of most municipalities.




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
