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#### **DESCRIPTION**

The circa 1912 Old Trail School is a one-story, wood-frame building with a steeply pitched, metal sheathed, front-gabled roof. The school has a rectangular plan (20' x 24') with a projecting front-gabled entry vestibule on its facade. The setting is an open plot of flat land covered by buffalo grass. A flagpole and a modern, non-functional wellhouse complete the landscaping. A cornerstone from a demolished Wiggins high school is used as the base of the flagpole erected on the site in 1974.

The school rises from a concrete and cinderblock foundation. All exterior walls are sheathed in horizontal wood drop siding. All windows are original, wood frame, one-over-one double-hung sash. Installation of undersize metal-frame storm windows necessitated the use of a small wood panel infill at the top of each window opening. Rafter ends and purlins are visible beneath the eaves. A short brick chimney rises through the roof ridge just behind the east gable.

Entry to the schoolhouse is through a glazed three-panel vestibule door. The door is accessed from a concrete stoop. To the north of the door is a window and to the south is a framed wood panel, most likely used for posting notices. A wood panel sign in the gable contains the school name and the notation, "Est. 1917." The north and south sides of the vestibule are without fenestration. The facade of the main building contains a single window.

The south side contains three evenly-spaced windows. The north side mirrors the south with the exclusion of the western-most window. The west (rear) side is without fenestration.

The east, south and north interior walls of the vestibule are sheathed in horizontal bead-board. The west wall consists of the drop siding of the original facade exterior. The vestibule served as a cloakroom and the coat hooks remain along the south wall. The floor is of pine boards and the ceiling is narrow bead-board. A two-panel door opens into the single classroom.

The classroom walls and ceiling are lath and plaster. The floor is of narrow tongue-and-groove oak. The original cast iron stove stands toward the rear of the room, directly in front of the door, and is vented by a long stove pipe to the brick chimney flue over the entry door. A storage cabinet in the east wall to the north of the entry protrudes into the cloakroom.

The interior is furnished with period desks. The blackboard on the west wall is contemporary to the building's use.

#### **Alterations**

The most significant change to the building has been its relocation. Constructed in about 1912, the building originally stood on the Reed Homestead. The school district relocated the building in 1917 to a site near the Fort Morgan cut-off on the Overland Trail.

School consolidation in 1946 resulted in the relocation of the schoolhouse to Wiggins where it was placed next to an existing school building and used as a music room. Expansion of school facilities in 1963 included the construction of a new music room, rendering the older building obsolete. The Wiggins Historical Group purchased the building in 1964 and relocated it to its present site at 421 High Street.

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The vestibule/cloakroom was added in 1926. It appears that one of the original facade windows was relocated in the vestibule facade. The removal of the window most likely corresponded to the construction of the classroom in-wall storage cabinet.

Minor alterations to the building include interior lighting and heating changes made during its use as a music room, the addition of the metal-frame storm windows, and the replacement of the wood roof shingles with metal panels. At some point the wood stove was moved from the rear to the front of the classroom. Later the stove was returned to the rear and vented to the original chimney.




Figure 1. Old Trail School Floor Plan

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#### **SIGNIFICANCE**

The circa 1912 Old Trail School is eligible for listing in the National Register under Criterion C for its architectural significance. The schoolhouse is a typical example of a prairie school in Morgan County. It exhibits the distinguishing characteristics of rural one-room schoolhouses as defined in the multiple property document, *Rural School Buildings in Colorado*. The period of historical use extends from 1912 to 1964. However, as the school was moved after the end of the period of educational significance, the building is considered to be eligible only for its architectural significance. Two periods of significance apply–1912, for the original construction, and 1926 for the addition of the vestibule/cloakroom, a typical rural schoolhouse feature.

The multiple property document states that:

the most common schoolhouse built in the state during the late 19<sup>th</sup> and early 20<sup>th</sup> century was one-story, wood frame with a gable roof and a rectangular plan. It had a central entry in the gabled end; large, double-hung sash windows evenly spaced on the side walls; a single undivided interior space; and often included a belfry.

With the exception of the belfry, the Old Trail School incorporates all these character-defining elements.

Vestibules were commonly added to the basic schoolhouse form. While not originally constructed with a vestibule, the Old Trail School received one as an addition in 1926. The off-center design is unusual. Supporting documentation does not exist, but it is likely that the design was inspired by a desire to retain the use of one of the two existing facade windows. In fact, it appears that the other window was removed and reinstalled in the vestibule's east wall.

The Old Trail School was relocated twice during its historical period of significance, first in 1917 and again in 1946. The school was moved a final time in 1964 after the discontinuance of use as a school district facility. Though removed from the sites of its historical association and though reoriented from its historic alignment, the character-defining architectural features remain intact. The building is fully capable of conveying its architectural significance in its current location and setting.

#### **Historical Background**

Throughout United States history, the construction of a schoolhouse represented the establishment of a settlement or the development of a region. In the fertile region known as Morgan County, agriculture and ranching quickly became the mainstay of the economy. The land acts of 1862, one of them being the Homestead Act, provided a way for settlers to become land owners. Farmers and ranchers were the predominant settlers. However, as the railroad pushed westward carrying gold seekers to the Rocky Mountains, many would-be or discouraged prospectors and their families turned to agricultural pursuits and settled on the prairie. Growing numbers of families led to a need for schools to educate the children. Country schools began to dot the rural landscape.

On October 13, 1883, local residents organized School District 42 in Weld County. Morgan County was organized separately from Weld County, and in 1889, the records of District 42 were transferred to Fort

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Morgan. On March 1, 1908, District 12, north of District 42, was organized to extend from the north boundary of District 42, two miles north of Wiggins, to the South Platte River. On June 14, 1918, the area of District 42, including the north one-third of Township 2N, was annexed by District 12. On October 23, 1919, District 12 became District 124-Joint. On October 1, 1946, when rapidly increasing population caused new activities in school affairs, District 42 was consolidated with District 124 Joint to became District 50 Joint, under which name it still exists.

There have been as many as 16 edifices in the present school area. The portion of the original District 42 left intact after the withdrawal of the north sections in 1918 boasted six of these school buildings. The Old Trail School was one of the six rural schools located within District 42 to the east end and northeast comer of this district. The school was originally called the "Reed School" as it was located on the Reed Homestead.

According to Blanche Reed, a former student of the Old Trail School, the population was sparse in the Reed School section. Therefore the school was moved in 1917 to a more central location with a denser population. The school was renamed the Old Trail School since it was on the Fort Morgan cut-off branch of the Overland Trail. The Overland Trail forked into a north trail and a south trail. The southern trail followed the South Platte River to the settlement of Denver. Freighters and express riders used the southern branch of the trail as a short-cut to and from the growing city.

Former student, Neil Rosener, reported eight students were enrolled when he began his schooling at Old Trail School. Enrollment grew to around twenty as evidenced in a 1923 photograph (*Fig. 2*). Another former student, William Hogan of Golden, reported fifteen students enrolled in 1939-40 during his eighth-grade year.

Upon consolidation of the two school districts in 1946, the school board moved the Old Trail School to the school property in Wiggins where the building was used as a music room. The area students served by the Old Trail School now attended the school in Wiggins.

In 1963, citizens approved a bond issue for the expansion of school facilities. Among the improvements was a new music room. To make way for the construction, the Old Trail School once again needed a new home. In 1964, the Wiggins Historical Group, Inc. purchased the school and moved it to the present location in Wiggins at 421 High Street.

There have been minor changes in the interior for heating and lighting purposes when used as a music room. The Old Trail School building retains its physical integrity and is the only remaining one-room public school in Morgan County. The Old Trail School building should be preserved as a monument to the early twentieth century agricultural settlement of the area.

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


Figure 3. Old Trail School Photograph Location and Views
