The Classical Revival style is represented by Rowallan, a 28-room, 2 1/2-story, wood frame residence at 253 John Anderson Highway. The house was constructed in 1913 and is comprised basically of a large central block with symmetrical dependent wings. The central pavilion features a hip roof portico supported by boxed columns. Simple moldings give the columns an approximation of the Tuscan order, and these support a narrow architrave rather than a full entablature. A small porch with details similar to the portico is found on the north elevation of the house. The weatherboard structure rests on brick piers, and both the central block and wings are covered by gable roofs with gable dormers. Two massive brick chimneys mark the division of the central block and the wings. The main entrance is surmounted by a broken pediment and has sidelights. The facade of the main block is also distinguished by four sets of French doors. The main windows in the house are 6/6 light double hung sashes which—like the French doors—have been fitted with movable louvered shutters.

State significance of property, and justify criteria, criteria considerations, and areas and periods of significance noted above.

Rowallan is primarily significant through its association with the development of Ormond Beach as a tourist and recreation center. Those persons who built winter homes in the city after the beginning of the twentieth century usually had entirely personal motives, unlike the early settlers who undertook a communal effort to develop the commercial and recreational potential of the are for the benefit of the group as a whole. The later residents did not have the backing of a company, as did the founders of New Britain (the early name of Ormond Beach), most of whome were employees of the Corbin Lock Company. The house is nevertheless important for it exemplifies the fact that Ormond Beach was no longer just an insular settlement catering to the needs of a single group of individuals but had gained widespread recognition as a winter resort area.

The house was constructed in 1913 for Alexander Miller Lindsay, a retail merchandize executive from Rochester, New York. Lindsay sold the property in 1918, and it again changed hand in 1938, when it was purchased by its present owner Mrs. Eileen Butts.

This house fulfills criterion A for listing in the National Register. It is associated with that phase of development that led to the wider settlement of Ormond Beach as a tourist and winter residency area.
